ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETS With Prof. Lucie Hirata back from China for one month, the Committee for the Project met on Jan. 23 at UCLA. Present were UCLA Professors Alex Saxton and H.H. Chow, Acting Director Suellen Cheng, Society rep. Munson Kwok and newly appointed Society rep. Gerald Shue, pastpresident.

A major decision announced to the Committee by Hirata was the formal extension of the Project from June to at least Feb. 28, 1981. She expressed the hope that Society would continue its strong volunteer support through the period.

Quarterly progress reports were given by Cheng and by Kwok and Shue.

Quality control of the oral history interviews was discussed. Improvement in questions and feedback to interviewers on techniques were points covered. A review of selected tapes by the Committee followed by a workshops series for interviewers is to be scheduled shortly.

AUXILIARY COLLECTION This collecti managed by the Society consists of artifacts and pictures donated by interviewees or offered for duplication. Currently the collection exceeds 700 items.
