ORAL HISTORY PROJECT UP-DATE

Munson Kwok and his oral history project committee have made some enviable accomplishments in the past few months. Several more interviews were completed, a major one being with the Wong Louis family in San Luis Obispo. A group consisting of Suellen Cheng, Munson Kwok, Eugene Moy and John Yee journeyed to the central California town to interview Young and Stella Louis.

The major support of the Society has been involved with the indexing phase of the project, funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities. The required 300 man-hours were accomplished in five months (by September), some four months ahead of schedule. The committee still

owes 80 hours to the UCLA Asian American Studies Center. By project's end early this year, the Society should be free and clear of obligations.
