"THE LADY" NEEDS A LIFT!!

On Oct. 28, 1986, "The Lady", more famously known as the Statue of Liberty, will be celebrating her centennial birthday. For such a momentous occasion, "The Lady" must look her best -- and that is the reason why she is undergoing a tremendous restoration project to prepare her for the BIG day.

For all these many years, the Statue of Liberty, a gift from France to America to celebrate the great friendship between two countries, has stood as a symbol of freedom and hope. She has welcomed millions of immigrants to this "promised land" with these touching phrases written by poet Emma Lazarus:

".....Give me your tired, your poor,
Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free,
The wretched refuse of your teeming shore.
Send these, the homeless, tempest-tossed to me,
I lift my lamp beside the golden door!"

Today, due to the ravages of time and harsh weather, the Statue has been weakened, with several sections declared unsafe for visitors. Funds have been solicited to provide for the restoration of this great "Lady". Americans from all walks of life are sharing in this historic occasion -- large business corporations, small private companies, school children, the "man in the street".

At the Society's March meeting, it was suggested (and approved by the Board and attending members) that CHSSC as a historical society would accept donations from members and friends to share in the restoration of the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island.

FIDDLETOWN SUCCESS!!! Chuck and George Yee have just reported that their "cousin", Dr. Herbert Yee of Sacramento, has happily announced that the Fiddletown museum (Chew Kee Store) will be receiving \$80,000 from the recently mandated California state preservation funds. Congratulations to the folks in Fiddletown and Dr. Yee!!! The money is much needed if this historic structure is to be saved. These funds will require a 10% community match. Details to follow.

THE (RIVERSIDE) CHINATOWN DIG. Finds from excavations of the Wong Ho Leun (Riverside Chinatown) site will be discussed in four papers to be presented at the annual meeting of the Society for California Archaelogy, San Diego, March 28-30. The finds will be discussed Thursday, March 28, 8 A.M. during the symposium on Overseas Chinese Topical Studies, chaired by member Paul Chace. The paper is entitled "Promoting Anthropology in Community Heritage: The Riverside Chinatown Investigation," by Clark Brott and Chace. Also given will be "Feng Shui:Chinese Geomancy at Riverside's Chinatown," by Fred Mueller, Jr., "Turtle Husbandry at Riverside," MacDonald, and "Market Fisheries:Evidence from Riverside's Chinatown," Collins and Roeder.

Finds have included building remains prior to 1893, a brass dragon vase handle, a Mongol horse, a porcelain bracelet and spoons, medicine bottles, jugs and pieces of other Chinese ware. Students from Palomar College have been working the dig. Dig volunteers call (619) 224-8340.
