FASHIONS FROM THE PAST During CHSSC's BIG TEN celebration this year, one of the most outstanding events was the lovely fashion show held on Saturday, Sept. 21, at the Castaway Restaurant, high atop a hill in Burbank with a gorgeous view of the city. It was a highly successful event, not only because over 400 reservations were received, but because the entire show was presented with authenticity, professionalism, and much more than a mere touch of class -- in one word -- superfantastic!!

Beautifully scripted, produced and narrated by Barbara Jean Lee, the fashions were presented in three segments:

First -- costumes worn by members of the Imperial Court of the Chou Dynasty. Gentlemen models Gilbert Leong, Chuck Yee, Art Young and George Tom were the essence of royal dignity as the male court members.

Second -- very beautiful costumes from the past and present. Some were more than 100 years old, and many were authentic clothes from the Ching Dynasty. These were modelled by lovely young ladies, many of whom were daughters or friends of Society members.

Third -- an authentic wedding dance performed by Sheri Chow and David Wing Tse, with the traditional tying of the knot in a wide red ribbon to signify their unity. Following the dance, ten gorgeous wedding costumes were shown, some belonging to a grandmother, mother, or aunt of the pretty models.

Behind the scenes -- imagine, if you will, two small dressing rooms filled with 15-20 people at any given time, in the midst of costumes, boxes, bags, make-up accessories, and sundry other items -- a state of confusion and frustration, to put it mildly. And yet -- when each model made her appearance on center stage, she was calm, poised, unruffled -- and pretty as a picture! Quite an accomplishment, and with no small effort on everyone's part.

To top off this excellent fashion display -- like extra icing on a cake -- there were a large number of raffle prizes to be distributed, including a camera, a lovely embroidered Chinese jacket, banquet tables for 10, beautiful fruit baskets, and various other prizes.

Certainly an event such as this could not have been such a huge success without the expertise of a few and the cooperation of many. EL PUEBLO CHINESE AMERICAN MUSEUM

Signficant progress has been made on planning the museum and its interior structure in the last few months. Architects Peter Snell and Gilbert Leong have arrived at an attractive, cogent design which will also allow restoration of the Garnier Building museum space to the 1900-1910 period. Major features will include a 3D version of Wing Wo's interior. (This is noted Chinatown CPA Billy Lew's family store.) Another major exhibit will be a Kuan Ti shrine. In the last month Jean Poole has assembled a major proposal for \$93,000 for building construction from the State Park and Recreation preservation bonds act fund (Prop. 18). A large number of support letters accompany this proposal, including those written by Munson Kwok for the Society, Howard Quon for the C.A.C.A., and one from the Old Los Angeles Co., the developer. The necessary political support has been expressed by Secretary Eu, Mayor Bradley, Senator Torres, Assemblywoman Molina, Councilman Lindsay, and Councilman Woo. Quon and Kwok have led an effort to attain parts of this support. In addition, the Park has committed \$50,000 of its own funds for construction. Eugene Moy has met the Society's committee on El Pueblo and reviewed the progress. Further discussion will be given at the Annual Meeting in November.

Now is the time for Members interested in research, collecting, L.A. Chinatown, grants development, exhibit planning, and fund raising to come forward. Munson Kwok, (213)828-6911 or Eugene Moy, (818)243-7601. This project has become exciting!!! It is beginning to roll.

CULTURE CENTER

The Society has advocated a cultural and community center because meeting space for heritage programs and gallery or exhibit space does not exist in L.A. Chinatown. The Chinatown CRA has announced a bond issue in which \$2,000,000 (of \$12M) is allocated to the cultural center effort. Last Friday, Oct. 25, Supervisor Edelman publicly announced before 900 at the Chinatown Service Center dinner that at center effort. least a portion of Lot 45 will be set aside for a cultural center.
