BIT OF NEWS: If you came to the general meeting on September 7, you saw that the ground was all broken up near the back end of the Chinatown Library. Through the fundraising efforts of the Friends of the Chinatown Library, there will be a much needed expansion of the library. The library will be on the first floor and four classrooms for Castelar School will be on the second floor. Construction will be approximately nine months, according to Bill Chun-Hoon, Principal of Castelar School. There will also be a new lunch shelter constructed.

SYMPATHIES: Arthur Hing Young (known to most of us as Art Young) was born January 11, 1913 and passed away September 27, 1988. Art is survived by son, Hobart Young; daughter-in-law, Tina Young; and brother, Waey Young. Art came from Zhongshan, Kwongtung Province at an early age. He grew up in Fresno, California and finished high school there. In World War II, he was with the Army in European Theater; in Normandy, France serving and receiving distinguished unit badge; European African Middle Eastern Campaign, received good conduct medal. He attended Rudolf School of Art in New York, getting his degree in 1941. He continued courses at Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, 1942. He worked with Corp of Engineers in New York. Later moved to Los Angeles working at California State Bureau of Reclamation in 1951; for 35 years was with California State Department of Transportation (since 1953). Earlier years he was a member of True Light Presbyterian Church; had served as church treasurer. Community interests with Chinatown 10-K Run, Lotus Festival, Dragon Boat Festival, and Chinese Historical Society of Southern California. Art was a perfectionist in whatever he tried to do. Excellent and wonderful cook, especially Chinese dishes. Has gourmet touch in cooking.

Pioneering journalist, Louise Leung Larson, passed away at her Topanga home early Saturday morning, October 1, from a massive stroke. She was 83 years old. Larson was the second oldest of eight children. She was born at 903 South Olive Street in downtown Los Angeles. Her father, an herbalist and scholar, prospered in his new country and the family moved to an 18-room house he built at Pico Boulevard and Union Avenue in 1914. Larson was one of the first Chinese-Americans to work on a metropolitan daily newspaper in Los Angeles, and perhaps in the country. Her career began in 1926 when, just out of USC, she was called on to replace a drunk reporter and cover city elections for the Los Angeles Record. She later reported for the San Francisco News and the Chicago Times. While Larson hated Chicago, she loved the Times, where she covered the Al Capone tax evasion trial and interviewed Albert Einstein. It was in Chicago where Larson married a United Press reporter. She moved back to Los Angeles in the mid-1930's, freelancing for a time before joining the staff of the Los Angeles Daily News in the early 1940's. Here she reported on Madame Chiang Kai-shek who was touring the country raising money for China's war with Japan. After taking time off to have children, she began covering Topanga and Malibu for The Outlook in 1958. She retired in 1971 but continued to work part time until 1975. She was enmeshed in writing her family's history. (Larson was a member of CHSSC and author of the book, Sweet Bamboo. The Society is planning to publish her book. The Book Committee is continuing to work closely with Louise Leung Larson's family to make progress in the publication of this book.) In 1983, she received the "Woman Warrior" lifetime achievement award from the Asian Pacific Women's Network. She was honored along with Rose Bird, Chief Justice of California. Later that year, the state Senate passed a resolution honoring her contributions to journalism. 1984, her work was honored in a cultural exhibit "Chinese Women of America: 1834-1982" at California State University, Los Angeles. In 1988, Larson was honored as a pioneer at the Society's June Progressive Dinner and in September, the Asian Journalists Association honored her at a gala banquet. She is survived by sons, Dan Larson of Topanga and Stan Larson of Arcata, and daughter, Jane of Portland, Oregon. three grandchildren. The family held a private service in Los Angeles on Sunday.

CHSSC extends its condolences to the families of Art Hing Young and Louise Leung Larson. We will miss each of them dearly.






PARKUNG ON SCHOOL PLAUGROUND ENTER ON COLLEGE STREET


