In 1986 CHSSC sponsored Felicia Lowe at a general meeting to show an excerpt from her film which was in progress at that time. The Society also assisted her in raising funds for the project. This important and moving film focuses on the experiences of Chinese immigrants who were processed and detained from 1910-1935 at Angel Island in San Francisco Bay. It reveals a significant and mostly ignored chapter in the history of Chinese immigration in the United States.



DIRECTIONS TO GENE AUTRY MUSEUM:

The museum is located in the city of Los Angeles' Griffith Park at the junction of the Golden State (5) and Ventura (134) Freeways.

It is adjacent to the Greater Los Angeles Zoo and on surface streets can be reached from Forest Lawn Drive, Victory Boulevard, or Los Feliz Boulevard. The museum is 15 minutes from the Los Angeles Civic Center and is accessible using RTD bus route 97.

Museum parking is free and immediately adjacent to the facility.



RECOMMENDATIONS FROM BYLAWS COMMITTEE (4/20/89): Because of the increased membership and many program activities of the Society, the Bylaws Committee and the Board recommend the following Phase I Bylaws concept changes for consideration at the June general meeting:

- First, that the number of board members be enlarged to no less than twelve (12) and 1. no more than sixteen (16). 2.
- Second, that the service year for board members and officers begin from July 1 through June 30 of the following year.
- 3. Third, to make this transition, (a) the term of the current officers will be extended to June 30, 1990, (b) the term of board members expiring on December 31, 1989 will be extended to June 30, 1990, and (c) the term of board members expiring on December 31, 1990 will be extended to June 30, 1991.
- Fourth, that the membership year for members dues be the same as now, on a calendar
- and Fifth, that the twelve-month period for financial purposes shall be the 5.

Notice of these bylaws amendments are in this issue of News 'n Notes and will be announced at the next meeting of the Society, as required by the Bylaws. The exact wording of the proposed amendments will be in the May issue of News 'n Notes. Discussion and voting will be at the June meeting.

The Bylaws Committee hopes that the Society will act favorably on these changes at the June meeting. If so, the Nominations Committee will begin immediately to seek nominees

Phase II of the proposed amendments will be presented in the early fall. guidelines and a new organizational structure will be proposed so our Society can function more effectively. Bylaws Committee members are Paul Louie (Chair), Munson Kwok, Bob Large, Eugene Moy, Ella Quan, and Kipham Kan (ex-officio). They will be happy to receive questions and input about these changes.

BOARD MEETING BRIEFS: The following motions were made at the Board meeting of March 16:

P. Louie moved that some one should look up the Society tax exempted papers and find out why the Society is not listed in the Publication 78. The motion was seconded by S. Mu

- F. Mah moved that the Board accept the proposed budget of the Chinese American Museum Fund for its fiscal year ending August 31, 1989, as recommended by the Fund Administrators. The motion was seconded by A. Wong and passed with 3 abstentions (S. Cheng, P. Lin, and T. McDannold).
- P. Louie moved to accept the CAMF procedures. The motion was seconded by F. Mah and passed with 3 abstentions (S. Cheng, P. Lin, and T. McDannold).
- F. Mah moved that the Board form a scholarship committee to set the qualifications and to participate in the selection process for a graduate intern for the MCAH project. The motion was seconded by S. Mu and passed. (4 in favor: F. Mah, A. Wong, S. Cheng, K. Kan; 3 opposed: S. Mu, P. Louie, P. Lin, and 1 abstention: T. McDannold).
- F. Mah moved that the Board designate the President of the Chinese Historical Society of Southern California (CHSSC), or a CHSSC member appointed by the President on an annual basis, as its representative on the Board of Directors of the Friends of the Museum of Chinese American History. The President, or his/her delegate, would be empowered to vote on issues before the Board of the Friends of the Museum of Chinese American History in accordance with the wishes of the Board, or in absence of such instructions, in the best interests of the Society. The motion was seconded by S. Mu and passed unanimously.
- P. Louie moved to include the Survey for MCAH in the Society next News 'n Notes. The motion was seconded by F. Mah and passed unanimously.

IN THE NEWS: CHSSC wishes Grace Chow a very Happy 90th Birthday! Many happy returns!

CHSSC member, Beulah Quo, will be performing in the next East West Players' production of "VACANCY", written by Lillian Hara and Dorie Rush Taylor, and directed by another veteran of East West Players, Norman Cohen. This is a play about two middle-aged immigrants: Anna Lim, who is Chinese, and a Dutch woman, Rosie Vedder. With humor and poignancy, the play illuminates the ambitions and frustrations, the loneliness and fears experienced by these strangers in a new land. The hunger of these two women for companionship, for a way to transcend the cultural and personality differences between them, is the story of many immigrants who seek a better life. But this is not only a "woman's story": the struggle of these two people to find friendship and love is the universal story of men and women everywhere. (See calendar section, May 17).

Bridging The Pacific — San Francisco Chinatown and Its People by Thomas W. Chinn. "The people of San Francisco's Chinatown have stories to tell that can touch any American of any race. Chinn tells their stories with sympathy and humor, and gives us a new look at San Francisco's early years." Bridging The Pacific describes the special role played by San Francisco Chinatown in the long struggle by the Chinese in America to break through the barriers imposed by discrimination and by their own culture. A guided tour through the complex web of families, business, and organizations that underlies Chinatown, it also tells the fascinating personal stories of more than fifty individual Chinese. The book includes 150 rare photographs from the author's own collection, family collections, and historical libraries including a Chinese parade in 1880, early maps of Chinatown, and Honorable Wu's Showboat Revue. Publisher: Chinese Historical Society of America. Release date: September, 1989.


