### FEBRUARY MEETING

PROGRAM: **The Power of Place — Mr. Drummond Buckley** (guest speaker)

The Society will host a slide presentation on The Power of Place, a non-profit corporation founded in 1983 to develop new approaches to urban design, public art and historic preservation. The Power of Place has identified several sites in Los Angeles which represent the economic contributions of the city's major ethnic and racial groups, including the City Market on San Pedro Street which was founded by Louis Gwan in 1909.

The Director of the Power of Place is Dolores Hayden, a professor of planning at UCLA's Graduate School of Architecture and Urban Planning. Drummond Buckley, a planning student and assistant to Hayden, will give the presentation.

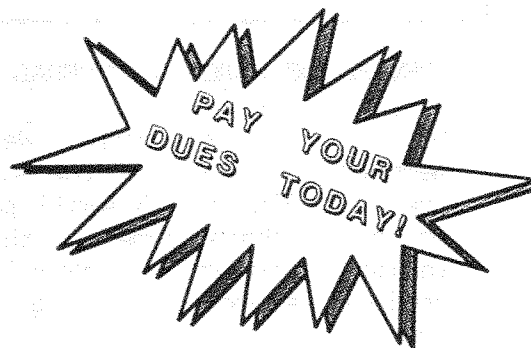

**IN THE NEWS: "SAVE THE BOOKS":** Central Library needs volunteers to help prepare books for the library's reopening. Closed by two arson fires, the Central Library is undergoing a \$152.4 million renovation and expansion, to be completed in 1992. Until then, the Central Library will move to temporary quarters opening in early 1989 at 433 South Spring Street in downtown Los Angeles. Help is needed to clean and inventory 700,000 water-damaged books and shelve over 1.8 million books. Volunteers for day and evening shifts are welcome Monday through Saturday at the temporary site. **Dr. William C. Chun-Hoon, Ph.D.** was honored on September 22, 1988 at the Elysian Masonic Temple in Los Angeles. He was presented with the 12th Annual Masonic Americanism Award by four Masonic Districts of the California Grand Lodge in admiration and appreciation for outstanding service to his country, the communities and his helping hand to all mankind throughout the world. On hand for the presentation were his wife, Marjorie; his mother-in-law, Jennie Lee; Dolores Wong, and Lauren Okayama. And here's more on Bill:

Dr. William Chun-Hoon was born in Honolulu, Hawaii on September 8, 1928. His parents were Chun Hoon who came from Chungshan, China. His mother Lee Oi was born in Honolulu. Dr. Chun-Hoon was the 12th of 15 children (8 girls and 7 boys).

In 1948 Dr. Chun-Hoon attended and graduated from the University of Colorado in Boulder, majoring in history, English and education. His career goal was to become a teacher.

In 1952, during the Korean-U.S. conflict, Dr. Chun-Hoon enlisted in the United States Air Force. Following his discharge in 1956 he returned to college at Columbia University in New York to pursue a masters degree in education. He graduated in June, 1957. During the summer after graduation he attended UC Berkeley to obtain sufficient credits in English subjects to qualify for his California teaching credential.

In 1957 Dr. Chun-Hoon married Marjorie Lee, an instructor in nursing at UCLA and began his teaching career at Griffith Jr. High School in East Los Angeles. Dr. and Mrs. Chun-Hoon have two children. Their son Craig (28) is married and lives in Los Angeles. He graduated from USC School of Business in accounting. He is a CPA and currently is in the financial department of MCA (Universal Studios). Two years ago he received his MBA from UCLA. Their daughter Kristina (23) just graduated from UC Berkeley in the Clinical Dietician field. She is currently working as a clinical dietician at USC County-General Hospital.

In 1966 Dr. Chun-Hoon was appointed as administrator in the Los Angeles Unified School District's program for disadvantaged and underachieving secondary students. Dr. Chun-Hoon worked closely with inner city secondary schools to raise student achievement levels in reading and math.

In 1969 Dr. Chun-Hoon was selected to the District's Reading Task Force, an elementary program to improve reading instruction in selected elementary schools in Los Angeles. Following three years as an administrator in this program in 1973 he was appointed as principal of Castelar School in the Chinatown area of Los Angeles.

During his 15 years as principal, he has been involved in the school and community of Chinatown. Castelar School, grades K to 6, is one of the oldest schools in Los Angeles. It opened in 1882 and now serves predominately Chinese children from a variety of Asian countries including Hong Kong, Taiwan, Vietnam, Cambodia and the People's Republic of China.

Dr. Chun-Hoon is a member of numerous community and professional organizations. Professional education organizations include: Phi Delta Kappa, Association of Los Angeles Administrators, Asian American Educators, California Alliance of Asian American Administrators.

From December, 197 until April, 1982 Dr. Chun-Hoon served as a member of the California Community College Board of Governors as an appointee of Governor Pat Brown, Jr. In 1978 he received his Ph.D. degree from Claremont Graduate School.

In September, 1988 he will begin his 16th year as principal of Castelar School where he is serving the educational needs of immigrant and refugee children and parents of the Chinatown area. It has given him great satisfaction over the years to see the personal and educational growth of so many of our Chinatown children into the mainstream of American life. It is not easy for these children and parents to make an adjustment from a foreign country into America, a totally new environment. Dr. Chun-Hoon is happy to be able to have done his part to make their transition into our country a smooth one.

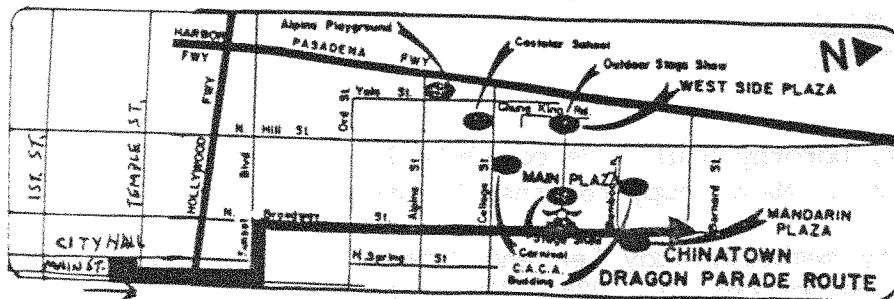

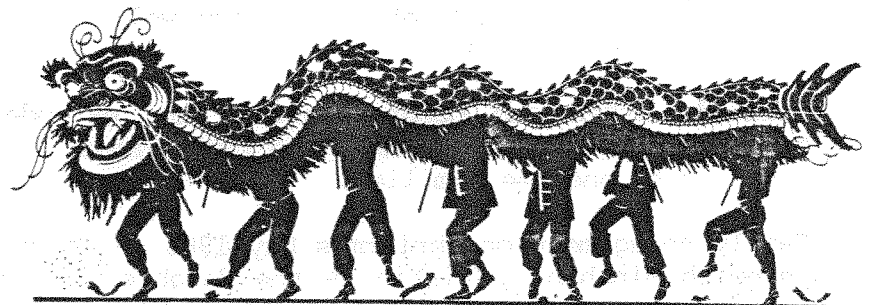
