CHINESE AMERICAN MATERIALS NEEDED FOR HISTORY PROJECT - KCET Television, the Los Angeles PBS station, will be producing a half-hour documentary film tentatively titled "Chinatown", as part of the ongoing TV series, THE LOS ANGELES HISTORY PROJECT. "Chinatown" will tell the story of Chinese Angelinos from 1850 to 1939, when LA's original Chinatown was displaced by the construction of Union Station. This film will show how, in the face of great difficulties, Chinese Angelinos created a vibrant, productive, and close-knit community, which contributed significantly to the city's growth, development, and culture. MUSIC CENTER THROWS BIRTHDAY PARTY FOR COMMUNITY - The Southern California community will soon be invited to help the Music Center of Los Angeles County "blow out the candles" on its 25th birthday cake. On December 6, 1964, the doors of the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion opened for the first time, and Zubin Mehta conducted the Los Angeles Philharmonic in an exuberant fanfare -- and the Music Center was born. On December 6, 1989, 25 years --

to the day! -- later, the Music Center will thank the community of Los Angeles for its ongoing support by throwing the most exciting "birthday party" the city has ever seen. Absolutely free of charge to the public, the lunchtime event, which will take place from 11:45 a.m. until 1:15 p.m. on the Music Center Plaza, will feature celebrity guest performers and masters of ceremony, on-air personalities Ken Minyard and Bob Arthur, of the "Ken and Bob Company" of KABC Talkradio, and the USC Marching Band with 25 outstanding high school bands from throughout Southern California, who will come together to "serenade" the Music Center and the thousands of birthday party guests on the Plaza. In addition, the Mark Taper Forum will be turned into a giant, decorated birthday cake in honor of the festivities, and free birthday cake, courtesy of the Westin Bonaventure Hotel, and Jerseymaid milk will be available free to the first 5,000 to join the festivities. FORBIDDEN CITY, USA is the latest work by Arthur Dong, producer/director of "Lotus" and "Sewing Woman". Dong is a member of CHSSC.

This is a documentary film about the remarkable and little-known story of second generation Chinese Americans, who in the 1930's battled tradition to join mainstream American culture. At Forbidden City, a San Francisco nightclub on the edge of Chinatown, Chinese American singers and dancers performed in all American musical revues. This film moves beyond the musical romance of "Flower Drum Song" to reveal how one group of Chinese Americans overcame adversity to pursue their dreams in the entertainment industry. PRACTICE MEANS EVERYTHING FOR KUNG FU CHAMP -- DR. LESTER WONG CHSSC member, Dr. Lester Wong, was featured in the October 19, 1989 edition of the Contra Costa Times. Wong is a Pharmacist at Kaiser-Martinez and Chairman of the Concord Human Rights Commission. He has been studying the art of Kung Fu off and on for 20 years but he doesn't have a black belt. Two weeks prior, he won a major black belt martial arts competition -- his second important championship in less than a month. His father was interested in Kung Fu and encouraged him to study the same. Wong sees Kung Fu as important culturally. Overall, it develops one mentally, physically, and spiritually. Part of the philosophy is to develop the body and mind through meditation. As he puts it, in the Chinese philosophy, you are fluid. You attempt to balance the energy flowing through your body. has competed against students of Karate as well as other martial arts disciplines. Wong travels to San Francisco once a week to study Kung Fu. On September 24, he won the weapons competition at the Pacific Amateur Athletic Association California State Kung Fu/Karate Championships at Hamilton Air Force Base. On October 7, he won the black belt Chinese Weapons division and black belt Chinese Forms division in the Second Annual Battle of the Bay Martial Arts Competition in Daly City. He has also won firsts in competitions at the Pacific Karate Championships, Northern Pacific Nationals and Pacific AAU region events to go with a score of other awards at the various competitions he's attended. Wong enjoys the weapons competition, in which contestants demonstrate their proficiency in a series of choregraphed moves. Wong's specialties are the staff and the plum

flower pick -- a crescent sword blade on the end of a stick. Wong conducted a Kung Fu class through the YMCA and is currently in contact with leisure service departments in Walnut Creek, Pleasant Hill, and Concord in an attempt to offer classes through the recreational programs. As you can see, Wong wants to see this art promoted. It's a long-term commitment. If one doesn't learn self-defense, the health and exercise is equally important.

OUTREACH UPDATE - Angi Ma Wong, Suellen Cheng, and Gene Moy served as docents for one hour to a group of 56 participants from Coro Foundation and World of Difference. They gave a slide presentation on October 12 at CACA, followed by catered dinner and student speakers involved in the Democracy Movement in Beijing, People's Republic of China.

Angi Ma Wong gave lecture and walking tour of Chinatown on October 14 as part of L. A. Unified School District multi-cultural inservice.
