CHINESE EXPERIENCES IN AUSTRALIA, CANADA, AND THE UNITED STATES

Speaker: Dr. John Liu

Dr. John Liu is Assistant Professor of the Program in Comparative Culture at the University of California, Irvine. He will speak on the Chinese experiences in Australia, Canada, and the United States. This topic has been Professor Liu's main area of research. His presentation will provide some interesting aspect of Chinese diaspora in the post-World War II period.

Professor Liu received his Ph.D. in Sociology from U.C.L.A. and is currently Co-chair of the Chinese American Council of the Historical & Cultural Foundation of Orange County. Among his research projects is the oral history project on the Chinese pioneers in Orange County.

With the Board's blessings, they started the tours with news releases to all the local newspapers and magazines. 1888 CHINESE BURIAL SHRINE UPDATE By action of the Los Angeles City
Council, the 19th Century Chinese
burial shrine in Evergreen Cemetery
is now a fully confirmed Los
Angeles Cultural Historical
Monument. The Society extends its
gratitude to Councilman Alatorre's
office, Roberta Greenwood, the Los
Angeles Conservancy, Edwin
Carpenter of the Huntington Library
and our many members who took time
to attend Cultural Heritage
Commission meetings, etc.

A shrine preservation committee was formed at our October meeting. The committee's mandate is to represent CHSSC in assuring the monument's preservation after protection under the law has lapsed.

We recently received some excellent 1898 photographs of the shrine and surrounding cemetery to be displayed at a future meeting.
