She has become one of the most active and distinguished members of the Asian American acting community. She is a successful producer, housewife, hostess, mother and grandmother. Not bad for someone whose acting career began quite by accident when she appeared in "Love Is A Many Splendored Thing". appeared in "Flower Drum Song," "The Sand Pebbles," "MacArthur," "Chinatown," "Marco Polo," "Steve Allen's Meeting of Minds," "My Three Sons," "Hawaii Five-O," "The Children of An Lac," "An Apple, An Orange," "Paper Angels," "General Hospital," -- just to name a few. She is a charter member and Vice President of the AAPAA (Association of Asian Pacific American Artists). She served as Vice President of United Way's Region V Board of Directors; a board member of El Nido Social Services; an active supporter, past president and board member of China Society; and popular mistress of ceremonies for many different functions -- from benefits and gala openings to

social meetings and 80th birthday parties. She graduated Phi Beta Kappa with a degree in sociology. After earning her B. A. at the University of California at Berkeley and an M. A. at the University of Chicago, she taught sociology at Los Angeles Community Colleges and at Ginling College in Nanking, China. In 1968 she became the first Asian American to produce and moderate TV public affairs programs on the Asian community. She later produced "James Wong Howe: The Man and His Movies." For that documentary, she became the first Asian American women to win a Hollywood-area Emmy. She is dedicated to public Her training ground was the YWCA in Berkeley, where service. she headed the community service department in college. YWCA in Los Angeles has recently presented her with their Silver Achievement Leadership Award for Volunteer Community Service. More recently she received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Association of Asian Pacific American Artists. She got her "Jimmie" on March 19 at the televised awards. was honored for her career and professional achievements and her numerous community projects over the years. Who is she? SOCIETY PUBLISHES NEW BOOK - SWEET BAMBOO is an intensely personal, affectionate memoir by pioneer Chinese American journalist Louise Leung Larson. The book traces the Tom Leung family from the Sun Duck County, Guangdong, China village of Sweet Bamboo through its evolution into a modern American family. It is a personal history, seen with a skilled reporter's eye, set against the background of a great City's formative years. The book tells an American success story about survival, enterprise, resourcefulness, and pluck. Above all, it describes the Americanization process of a close knit Chinese family at it struggles to preserve its heritage and develop its new identity reflecting two cultures, against a sometimes harsh social, political, and economic environment. CHINESE CUSTOMS by Rev. Henry Dore was first published in French in 1911. It was the first of an eight volume series on Chinese superstitions. Dore had lived in rural China during the late nineteenth century. This reprint is of the M. Kennelly English translation, first published in 1914. 



<u>Sweet Bamboo</u> is an American success story about survival, enterprise, and leadership, and above all, the Americanization process in a city where the Chinese struggled to maintain their community, families, and identity against political and legislative odds.
