YOU!



NOTEWORTHY

DISCOVER "CALIFORNIA GOLD" with Huell Howser

Beginning January, Californians are in for an honest-to-goodness adventure as they go along with Huell Howser on a search for "California Gold". This monthly 30-minute program will broadcast throughout the state on a regularly scheduled basis on PBS stations. The first segments will visit

- * The little town of Locke, in the Sacramento River Delta. It is the only town in the nation founded and settled entirely by Chinese.
- * Banning, in Riverside County, to hear first-hand Cahuilla Indian bird songs sung by members of the tribe. Possibly the

oldest musical form in North America, these Native American songs must be passed personally from generation to generation.

* The Antique Gas and Steam Engine
Museum in Vista, in San Diego
County, to participate in a
threshing bee and antique engine
show. The farm vehicles, machinery
and their operators are working
examples of California's
agricultural significance.

"California Gold" is funded by a grant from Wells Fargo Bank and is presented by Huell Howser Productions, in association with KCET-TV (PBS Los Angeles). Mr. Howser is producer/host of "California Gold", is a journalist whose philosophy of life is reflected in the stories he reports. Check local PBS program listings for exact time and date in your area.

Society member, Michael E. Engh, S.J., who is an Assistant Professor at Loyola Marymount University, would like to share this bit of information, which may be of interest to our members, on the Asian and Pacific Studies Program at the university. Due to space limitations, the information was reduced in size. (If you are interested, better copies will be available at our December 5 meeting.)

The Asian and Pacific Studies is an interdisciplinary, area studies program. It offers students who have a professional or personal interest in Asian and Pacific countries the opportunity to develop cultural expertise through an integrated course of study primarily in the liberal arts. Using various disciplines, including languages, the program aims at a better understanding of the peoples and traditions of Asia and the Pacific.

Requirements

Students, in consultation with the Director and the faculty, will be asked to declare a geographical, disciplinary or topical focus, and to plan an appropriate course of action. This enables them to acquire not only breadth but also a certain depth in their chosen focus of study. The minor requires 18 semester hours of course work:

1) core requirement (3 units) 2) language requirement (3 units) 3) three electives, at least two from the College of Liberal Arts (9 units)

4) capstone requirement (3 units)

Core Requirement

HIST 182 Modern Asia. This is an introduction to the general characteristics of Asian societies and the ways in which they have responded to the West in the 19th and 20th centuries.

Language Requirement

At least one semester of study in an Asian language is required. At LMU. course credit may be obtained for JAPN 101, 102, 201 or 202 and CHIN 101, 102, 201, or 202. Credit may also be obtained through the SOCCIS program for Arabic, Korean, Mongollan, Tagalog and Sanskrit offered at UCLA. Students are strongly encouraged to do additional language work.

Electives

Students choose six units, i.e. two courses, in the College of Liberal Arts and three additional units, i.e. one other course, in the College of Liberal Arts, the College Communication and Fine Arts, or the College of Business Administration. At present the following courses are on offer:

Aside from the academic program, students in Asian and Pacific Studies will find at LMU several organizations and activities which will foster and deepen their

knowledge and appreciation of Asian and Pacific countries.

• LMU sponsors a number of student organizations, thus providing ample opportunities for student activities. Some of these have Asian and Pacific Interest, such as the Asian Pacific Student Association, the Chinese Club, Filipino/American Society, Indonesian Club, International Student Association, NA Kolea, Tae Kwon Do, LMU Judo Kyokai.

 LMU has a Study Abroad program, which gives the students a chance to study in, among other locations. Beiling, Talpei, Nagoya, Tokyo, Kawagoe and Sindentification.

The Office of Chinese-American Academic Exchanges, which serves American Jesuit colleges and universities, is located at LMU.

Capstone Requirement

This requirement enables the students to integrate their work in Asian and Pacific Studies by doing either ASPA 498 Special Studies or ASPA 499 Independent Studies. The actual content of the course will depend on the students' chosen focus.
