NOVEMBER PROGRAM

The Chinese Historical Society is invited to a preview screening of the third season of "Los Angeles History Project", the KCET Emmy award-winning series on the rich diversity and dramatic struggles upon which Los Angeles was built. The series includes "Hollywood Strike", "Sister Aimee", "Chinatown: Between Two Worlds" and "Harbor Wars" which will all be shown on KCET during the month of November.

The preview screening will take place on Thursday, November 15, 1990 5:30 - 7:30 p.m. at KCET 4401 Sunset Boulevard, Los Angeles, CA 90027.

"Chinatown: Between Two Worlds" is produced and written by Arthur Barron. It is about L.A.'s Chinatown — a place not quite China and yet not quite America — as seen through the eyes of three generations of residents. It's the story of the struggle of a people for family, community, identity and acceptance in the face of the most profound, enduring prejudice experienced by any immigrant group in the city's history. The Chinese Historical Society participated in the production through its representative, Emma Woo Louie (and not Emma Wong Louie, as it was reported last month. Sorry for the mistake, Emma!). And our Board Member, Suellen Cheng is the Historical Consultant of the production.

Board Briefs

The following motions were passed in the August and September Board meetings:

- To support L.A. History Day every year.
- To decide by March 1, 1991 to stay in or pull out of the 1991 Moon Festival if the issues [pertaining to co-sponsoring it with the CCACC] cannot be resolved.
- To accept and approve the 1990/91 budget proposal [by the Administrators of the Museum of Chinese American History Fund].

Scholarship

The Chinese Historical Society of Southern California has been selected by UCLA Extension as a SEED partner. SEED means Scholarship to Encourage Extension Diversity and its goal is to co-sponsor scholarships for deserving students who could not otherwise afford to attend UCLA Extension. As a SEED partner, CHSSC is asked to identify and select one qualified candidate to participate in the program. This candidate is eligible for a scholarship for career, degree-credited and/or personal development courses taken — up to a total of eight courses.

CHSSC's Field Trip

Johnny Yee, leader of the CHSSC'sField Trip which took place September 28-31, 1990 made the following report:

A small group from the CHSSC had a most enjoyable and successful trip to the Joss Houses and Mother Lode of Northern California. Since we had to cancel the charter bus due to the last minute defection of many members, we traveled by private car and were able to extend the trip for an extra day and take many side trips. We covered 1,900 miles. The main stops were Marysville, Oroville, Weaverville, Eureka, Redwood Highway, Mendocino, Ukiah, Wine Country, Locke and San Luis Obispo. The side trips were of the most interest since many of the sites visited were unknown to many of us.

We went to the following places:

- Richvale, the heart of California rice fileds, with a street named Cal Rose;
- Weaverville Battle Field, site of the first Tong War fought in California;
- Caspar Bay where the Hee family arrived after sailing from China in 1850. They were the survivors of a group of six vessels of which only two made it. Bob Nash, one of CHSSC's first members led an expedition there and found a sunken vessel and brought back some artifacts in December 1975;
- Mendocino where a Joss House built by the Hee family has been handed down from generation to generation. It is still used today by the family which is the only Chinese family in Mendocino. It is the only building painted red and green in this historical town where the city code dictates what can be done;
- Rio Vista where a special tribute was given at the Chinese Cemetery to the memory of the Chinese pioneers who were blown up aboard the steam boat "Yosemite";
- Cambria which houses one of the only two or three remaining "modest" Joss Houses in California. A fine welcome committee greeted our group. The local newspaper came out with a photographer and subsequently reported our visit on its front page. The old timers remember the Chinese gathering kelp in the area and on Chinese New Year, gifts of Lychee nuts and coconut candy were exchanged. We saw an old photograph of three Chinese taking a roasted Barbecued pig out of the oven;

- Port San Luis where Ah Louis of San Luis Obispo contracted, a Chinese crew to build a narrow garage railroad from Port San Luis to San Luis Obispo and Los Olivos for a total of 76 miles. This is also the bay where Teddy Roosevelt sent the great "white fleet" of battleship around the world.
