Cherylene Lee, a talented actress and playwright will read excerpts from her plays "Wong Bow Rides Again" and "Yin Chin Bow" and discuss how she presents oral history through drama. "Wong Bow Rides Again" was produced by East West Players in Los Angeles in February 1987 to critical acclaim. "Yin Chin Bow" was the 1990 cowinner "Best of Festival" in the Third Step Theater's 3rd Annual Spring Play Reading Festival, New York. Both plays are based on the history of Cherylene's family.

Cherylene Lee was recently selected for the 1991 Mentor playwrights program by the Mark Taper Forum Theater. Her poetry and short stories have been published by the *Southern California Anthology* 1985, the *International Examiner*, *Plexus*, *New Methods*, *Bamboo Ridge*. She was awarded Artist in Residence at the Ucross Foundation, Wyoming for 1988 and the Djerassi Foundation, Woodside, California for 1989. She is in the process of writing a musical. Cherylene is also an actress with many performing credits on stage, TV, film and clubs. Field trip to Mexicali

The Society is planning a field trip to Mexicali, Baja California, Mexico on May 25 and 26, 1991. We will be joining the Chinese Historical Society of Greater San Diego and Baja California which is sponsoring this trip. A chartered bus will take us from San Diego to Mexicali (approximately 125 miles). On the bus you will be provided with a copy of the history of the Chinese influence on the development of Mexicali and Baja California. There will also be a bilingual Chinese Mexican member of San Diego's Society to provide us with additional information. In Mexicali, we will meet some of the local Chinese who will give us some background and history of the Chinese in Mexicali. We will tour the old Chinatown on foot and see some of the city sites by bus. Mexicali is noted for its Chinese restaurants. A banquet is planned at one of the best Chinese restaurants. Free time for shopping and individual activities will also be included in the schedule. The cost is \$110 per person, and includes transpor-

The cost is \$110 per person, and includes transportation, hotel based on double occupancy, Chinese Banquet, lunches, entertainment and tour. All reservations and monies must be in by May 18th. The bus holds 47 passengers and it is first pay, first served. After May 18, cancellations will be refunded only if there are more reservations than space available.

Board Briefs

The following board motions were passed at the February and March Board meetings:

- to pursue the acquisition of the Old Chinatown Metro Rail collection of artifacts and accept the costs involved.
- to appropriate \$250 for fund raising mailings to support the Evergreen Chinese Cemetery Shrine project.
- to authorize the Archives Committee to view the 1890 document of San Joaquin Valley Chinese name lists, to verify the publisher, to verify the provenance, and, if everything is in order, to buy the item. [At the April general meeting, the membership was informed that this document had been purchased.]
- to authorize a maximum of \$2,500 for a video system, which is to be put to use for the Society's purposes and activities.

The next scheduled Board Meeting is on May 15, 1991 at 7 p.m. at Castelar School.

Vignettes of History

The Chinese Historical Society of Southern California is proud to confer Centennial Honors on Ms. Caroline Chan, the first Chinese American school teacher in Southern California. This wonderful pioneer has recently celebrated her 100th birthday. Ms. Chan was honored by the Society in 1979 as a pioneer in education. She remained active until well into her 90's, serving as reservations chair for the China Society of Southern California.

We are told recently by members of the French Hospital Auxiliary that the beloved Lady of Chinatown, St. Joan of Arc, may be moving in the foreseable future. She is located on College Street, across from Castelar School. Not many weeks ago, she was festooned with yellow ribbons while our dedicated troops were serving in the Middle East. Her leaving will occur when the Auxiliary settles with a land buyer for their property. Their offices will move to the eastern part of Los Angeles county. The day that St. Joan leaves will be truly a sad one for Los Angeles history, for her people first settled on this property and planned their hospital in 1860. Over the years, she has become Chinatown's very own.

Incidentally, several members of the Auxiliary grew up in or lived in Chinatown. Others remember Old Chinatown from the good old days.

THE VOLUNTEERS OF AMERICA CHINA PROJECT

On May 11, 1991 the Volunteers of America will present the 1991 Marco Polo Award to renowned celebrity couple, Steve Allen and Jayne Meadows. The award, which honors the contributions of Mr. Allen and Ms. Meadows in creating bridges of understanding between the American and Chinese peoples, has been presented only once before — to famed entrepreneur H.
