"EARLY HISTORY OF THE CHINESE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH: 1925-1945"

The Chinese United Methodist Church, just recently honored by the Society for a Centennial of service to the Chinese American community, will be discussed further by long-time member Gilbert Leong. During the period to be described, the church played an important role in the Chinese American history of Los Angeles. The Society is pleased to have Gilbert Leong share his personal observations of the church's development and growth, and his family's participation, during the pivotal period of the transition from Old to New Chinatown. Slides and rare photographs will be shown.

Gilbert Leong graduated from the University of Southern California. He is a pioneering Chinese American architect and artist, and was honored as a Pioneer by the Society in 1985 during the Tenth Anniversary Celebrations.

Members of the CHSSC might like to visit a new exhibit of the artifacts and historical photographs of Old Chinatown, which will open on March 5 and continue until April 26. The materials will fill 17 display cases in the lobby of the Fine Arts Building, 811 West 7th Street, downtown Los Angeles. The building itself is well worth a visit, as an example of the city's architectural heritage.

The artifacts are from the collection excavated along what was once Apablaza Street, where Union Station stands now. The work was done in the area where Metro Rail is being constructed, in compliance with historic preservation law, and a report is being prepared by Greenwood and Associates, with the help of outside consultants and many members of the CHSSC.

Other single cases of cultural material have been placed in Union Station, at the Metro Rail Information Office on West 7th Street, and at the office of Rapid Transit District, 425 South Main Street, 6th floor.

HONOR TO CHSSC MEMBER JUDY LIU

After seven years of teaching at the University of San Diego, sociologist Judy Liu has won her share of awards, including her current designation as "California Professor of the Year".

In 1988, five years after joining the faculty at USD, the students voted her professor of the year. Last spring, she was one of 700 professors nationwide selected to receive the Sears Roebuck Foundation Teaching Excellence and Campus Leadership Award. And then last fall, she was given her current designation (see above) by the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education, the largest association of educational institutions in the country.

Judy lives for those moments of illumination, so she keeps the box on a shelf in her office, the trophy of a light-bulb hunter.
"The rewards of teaching are those few students you really touch," she said. "You literally see the light bulb go on."
