Board Briefs

At the April Board Meeting, the following motions were passed:

- to approve centennial honors for Caroline Chan who is the first Chinese American school teacher.
- to create a certificate in calligraphy to recognize Lim Quon who is the owner of the Formosa Cafe in Hollywood.
- to authorize M. Kwok, S. Mu and S. Cheng to explore the possibility of forming a broader association of historical societies while on a trip to San Franciscoto meet two historical societies in the Bay Area.

Next Board Meeting will take place on June 19, 1991 at 7:00 p.m. at Castelar School.

The Society received a plaque from the Board of Recreation and Park Commissioners who expressed their appreciation for our donation of a computer to the Museum of Chinese American History at El Pueblo de Los Angeles Park.

The By-laws Committee has proposed a new paragraph for the revised by-laws. The aim of the "Purpose" revision is to improve the expression of our Society's mission and to adjust the statement to better describe the Society's present main functions.

Article II - Purpose

The purpose of this society shall be to bring together those people interested in history, and especially in the history of the Chinese in Southern California at large. Understanding the history of our community is basic to our democratic way of life, gives us a better understanding of our state and nation and promotes a better appreciation of our Chinese American heritage.

The purpose of this Society shall be to bring together people with a mutual interest in the history of the Chinese and the Chinese Americans of Southern California. The Society and its members shall perform all the normal functions and activities of an established historical society and community institution in pursuit of gaining, preserving, and communicating knowledge of this important history. Knowing the heritage of our community is basic to maintaining our democratic, American way of life. An understanding of the significant role of the Chinese in Southern California contributes to and promotes a better appreciation of our rich, multi-cultural society.


