CHSSC HONORS JUDICIAL PIONEERS

Four outstanding Chinese Americans who were the first to attain their particular high judicial office were honored by the CHSSC on November 15 at its 1992 Awards Dinner held at the Golden Palace Restaurant.

Our honorees are Hon. Delbert E. Wong, the first Chinese American Municipal and Superior Court Judge in the continental United States; Hon. Elwood Lui, the first Associate Justice of the California Court of Appeal; the Hon. Joyce Kennard, the first Associate Justice of the California Supreme Court; and the Hon. Ronald S. W. Lew, the first and ONLY judge in Federal District Court in the continental United States with Chinese American ancestry.

Dolly Gee, President, and Robert N. Kwan, Past President of the So. Calif. Chinese American Lawyers Association assisted President Sue Yee in presenting the awards to our pioneers. Ms. Gee and Mr. Kwan's excellent introductions helped us recognize the dedication and great accomplishments in public and community services by each one.

Quoting Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, awards presenter Robert S. Kwan declared, "Historic continuity with the past is not a duty, it is a necessity." Recalling the thoughts of Justice Joyce Kennard, one of the evening's honorees, Kwan further noted that, person's achievement should be measured, not by the awards or honors one receives, but by the obstacles one has overcome...we owe a great debt to the Chinese American pioneers of the 19th Century because the social and legal obstacles facing them were enormous." Kwan then traced the use of the law "as an instrument of the majority to oppress the minority" (the Chinese), the subsequent legal battles of the Chinese, the struggle of some to become lawyers to work within the system, and "finally, I believe history has come full circle as the era for the success of our judicial pioneers was reached."

The evening was highlighted with honorees' acceptance responses. Their remarks were extremely moving, inspiring, and humorous. It was quite an experience for all 220 who attended.

A lively entertainment was presented by the well-known "Cold Tofu", an improvisation group comprised of actors and actresses of multiethnic background. Four judges were made the stars of the show and surprised the audience with their talent in comedic acting.

Post event stories and pictures appeared in the Chinese Daily News and New Kwong Tai Press.

CHINA VISIT

Al Lum, a long time member of CHSSC, just returned from a trip to Canton, China and vicinity and would like to share the following observations with you.

"The primary purpose of the tour was to attend the dedication ceremony of the newly completed Nam Long Hospital and to visit the On Ding School, both near Shekki, the capital city of Chung Shan. The Hawaii delegation consisted of 66 strong, headed by Albert Y. A. Ching, a merchant in Honolulu and brother-in-law of Al Lum, and by Winifred Ching, sister of Al Lum. the fifteen day tour originated in Honolulu, from October 19 to November 2. The group arrived in Hong Kong via China Airline and proceeded to the Chung Shan port on the Pearl River delta, via jet foil. The group was then bussed to the Chung Shan International Hotel.

The Nam Long Hospital dedication ceremony was indeed a gala affair with long lines of welcoming students, lion dancer, drum and bugle corps, firecrackers, and ceremonial speeches. The Hawaii delegation distinguish itself with colorful leis worn by each member. While in Nam Long, the group attended a classical Chinese opera.

The On Ding School visit was also memorable with lines of welcoming students, firecrackers, etc. Albert Ching is the Honorary Principal, since funds to construct this school was raised by him from oversea Chinese in Hawaii.

Al Lum visited his ancestral village of Tai Cha in the Nam Long district. What a thrill it was to discover his family home still intact!

Other cities visited were Shun Tak, Pun Yu, and Shao Hing. Of course we visited Choy Hung, the home of Dr. Sun Yet Sen, father of Republic of China. China is showing vigorous growth under capitalism. High rise commercial and residential buildings are springing up, especially in Sun Jun, just across the Hong Kong border, in contrast with my previous visit in 1988.

Of course, no visit to China is complete without a shopping spree in Hong Kong. We returned to Hawaii, all richer and wiser for the experience."


