SUN WING WO AND COMPANY

Sun Wing Wo and Company, located in the Garnier building at 419 and 421 Los Angeles Street, which is the future site of the Museum of Chinese American History, was one of the first general stores in old Chinatown. The store was opened in 1891 by Ow Bue Lew. As part of the first set of tenants ushered into the Garnier building, Sun Wing Wo saw the earliest days of the old Chinatown and witnessed generations of change and diversity. As part of the last to depart, the store was moved to new Chinatown by the descendants of Ow Bue Lew, Sun Wing Wo also saw its final days, as well as the emergence of the new Chinatown. Don't miss the fascinating history of The Sun Wing Wo General Store.

Our speakers will be Robin Dong and Philip Cheng. Ms. Dong and Mr. Cheng were summer interns at the El Pueblo Historical Park working for the Museum of Chinese American History project, courtesy of the Getty Grant program. They will present a slide show and share with us their findings on the Sun Wing Wo and Company.

A CARD TO THE FUTURE - Do you have an L.A. Library card? Would you like to go with a new version of it to the Central Library's grand opening celebration, Sunday, October 3?

Since the new library will be fully computerized, the only card you can use there starting on that date to check out any of the more than 2.1 million books, some 10,000 magazine subscriptions, 500,000 photographs of Southern California, plus thousands of CDs, videos, cassettes, etc., is a new plastic computer card they have ready to offer you now. The branch libraries, including Chinatown, have them free. Just fill out a simple application form, show them a valid ID, and you can walk out with your very own card, ready for October 3. They're also available at participating Carl's Jr., First Interstate Bank, Robinson's-May, Broadway stores, KLOS, and other merchants. Until each branch also becomes computerized, use your old card there.

What does the new card offer? At the newly restored and expanded central opening, there will be free tours, two outdoor stages with continuous entertainment, storytellers, opera, family creative

workshops, and Barney the Dinosaur. Hungry? There will be fast food outlets and gourmet restaurant fare available, and ice cream for all. Parking discounts at adjacent garages will be offered with the new card. Several merchants and L.A. attractions also offer special discounts.

To celebrate the gala reopening, our Society will co-sponsor a FREE photo exhibit on "Chinatown" at the Chinatown Public Safety Association, in the community room, 823 North Hill Street, Los Angeles, from Saturday, September 25 to Sunday, October 10, illustrating both the stability and changes in the Chinese community from the late 19th century to the present. Opening attractions don't end on October 3. From October 5-31, a succession of leading authors and writers, jazz and classical concerts, opera recitals, the Asian American Friends of CTG play readings, Bob Baker Marionettes, Councilman Mike Hernandez, a Jim Henson tribute, ethnic food authors, Julia Child, cartoon characters, etc. will all be in programs within a new 250-seat Mark Taper Auditorium, various book departments, and outdoors on the west lawn. Program schedules are available at all libraries, First Interstate Banks, Robinson's-May, KCBS, KNX, and KLOS.

The new center on Fifth and Flower Streets will also contain the historic familiar Rotunda, a conference center, gift shop, gourmet and cafe restaurants, KLOS (childrens') Story Theater, and public garden, with escalators and elevators to take you there.

Your new card will be your key to many enjoyable hours.

5K AMERICAN HEART WALK - CHINATOWN BRANCH - The Chinatown Branch of the American Heart Association will hold its first Heart Walk to benefit heart research and community programs such as free screening for blood pressure and cholesterol; and to print Chinese bilingual materials to prevent heart disease.

The walk begins 9 a.m., Saturday, October 2, from Castelar School through the Civic Center, Little Tokyo, Olvera Street, El Pueblo de Los Angeles Historic Park and back to Chinatown where the Moon Festival/Street Fair will be taking place. It is an interesting cultural and historic walk into three ethnic communities; and it will promote walking as a viable way to exercise.

The Chinatown Heart Association would like to invite members to participate in the Walk (5K/3.1 miles). Free blood pressure and cholesterol screening will also be available at the site by the Chinatown Service Center with funds donated by the Pacific Alliance Medical Center Foundation. CAROLINE CHAN - With great regret, the Society must announce the passing of Ms. Caroline Chan, the first Chinese American school teacher in Southern California. Ms. Chan was 103. She was the recipient of the Society's Pioneer Award as the first school teacher and as a Chinese American woman pioneer. Later, she received Centennial Honors for these lifetime achievements. Ms. Chan was active in the China Society of Southern California, other community organizations, and an active member of the Chinese Methodist Church all her life.
