Barbecue/Open House at Chinatown Heritage & Visitors Center

CHSSC members and guests were treated to a fine afternoon of food and fellowship at our <u>First</u> event at the site of the planned Chinatown Heritage & Visitors Center on Bernard Street. Over 100 persons gathered in the current back patio on Saturday September 10th to sample the delicious potluck offerings cooked up by our members. Chefs Irvin Lai and Cy Wong presided over the hot coals with their savory recipes for chicken and hot links, and DJ Jim Fong provided oldies recordings, to add to the wonderful atmosphere.

In addition, everyone had the opportunity to tour one of the two historic houses on the property. The structure built by Philipp Fritz in 1886 and occupied by the late Louise M. (Fritz) Whiting for 100 years had been diligently prepared by CHSSC work crews over the prior two Saturdays. We saw informational displays including copies of historic documents and photographs, and family portraits provided by Philipp's great grandson Richard Fritz and by other members of the Fritz family. We admired the craftsmanship of the exterior carpentry, the ornamental light fixtures, the detailed door and window hardware. Perhaps more than a few of us squinted our eyes and imagined how the property could look in the future with a completely renovated CHSSC office, with visitors coming to pick up Chinatown historical and community information, to look up their family history, to be inspired by exhibits on our community's multicultural heritage.

We were honored with the presence of several members of the newly formed Advisory Board for the project. Joining in the festivities were Barbara Jean Lee, Lilly V. Lee, Robert Lee, and Kim Tsai. Mr. F. Chow Chan was not able to attend, but was represented by Board member Ken Chan. These community leaders along with other members of the Advisory Board will be assisting us in the planning and fundraising for the Heritage and Visitors Center, and we warmly welcome their interest and participation.

We also had a chance to chat with members of Louise M. Whiting's family: Marie Riley, a first cousin of Louise, and who grew up in the area, attending Macy Steet School; Beverly Vanatta, niece of Marie Riley; and Beverly's husband Phil. These are the family members who have been handling Louise Whiting's estate, and who have generously offered to assist in the project by providing very favorable financing terms in the sale to the CHSSC. The family provided a few stories about Louise, and we hope they may share more in the future.

Such a festive event would not have been possible without a dedicated team of volunteers. Thanks to Ella Quan and Sylvia Soo Hoo for coordinating food and reservations; Ben and Doreen Nakayama, Elmo Gambarana, John Wong and family, and Gene Moy for site setup, Pauline Wong for check-in; Betty Wong for all-around help (she was busier than anyone, including hubby Cy!) and numerous people for cleanup. REPORTING THE 4TH CHINESE AMERICAN STUDIES CONFERENCE. "FROM MEMORIES TO ASPIRATIONS: THE CHINESE AMERICAN EXPERIENCE" was held in Honolulu on August 19-20, at the elegant Ala Moana Hotel. Cosponsored by the Hawai'i Chinese History Center, the Organization of Chinese American Women: Honolulu, and Chinese Community Action Coalition of Hawai'i, this national symposium, which followed our meeting of 1992, attracted around 200. Included were CHSSC members Emma and Paul Louie, Winifred and Calvin Lee, Suellen and Munson Kwok, among others. And it was good to greet member Puanani Woo, these days based in Hilo. One of her groups has just completed restoration of an historic Chinese cemetery in Hilo. Those giving papers were Kenneth Klein, coauthoring with Charles C. Wong, and Shirley Tam. Him Mark Lai, better known to be with the Chinese Historical Society of America than as one of our members, and Murray Lee from San Diego also presented works.

Besides the expected panels on history and social sciences, One theme appearing to emerge from this conference was a strong emphasis on family history and genealogy, its methods, and the search for personal roots. Him Mark Lai and Albert Cheng has been invited to speak on the outstanding "In Search of Roots" program, which annually allows a summer's study of family history by college undergrads, climaxed by a trip back to the ancestral village in China. Another was the new research emphasizing the recent immigrant and settler--Chinese America in the last 30 years. Hawai'i's geographical position gave rise to some discussion of Pacific Rim impacts, such as the impending changes in Hong Kong. Prof. Greg. Mark managed to facilitate research participations by undergraduate students, which had not been a feature in previous conferences, but should be installed as a future tradition. Another feature of this event was the continual showing of Chinese American videos from the NAATA collection (except for "Separate Lives, Broken Dreams," the Chinese American Citizens Alliance production inserted into the program by Munson Kwok.) The loosely knit network of historical societies has determined that the next in the series of Chinese American studies conferences will be held in New York City, possibly in 1996 or 1997, with San Diego following.

No event in Hawai'i is ever completed without recognizing the warm and complete hospitality of the hosts, headed by Center President Roger Liu and Prof. Greg Mark with the conference committee, small but mighty. One of the nicest experiences has to be seen Mr. and Mrs. Wally Wong, a couple approaching their 90's, entertaining us at the lu'au with their hulas and ukelele music!!

The Kwoks were able to tour the Waipahu Plantation Village, a reconstruction of plantation structures and life several miles from downtown Honolulu. There, a reproduction of the Chung Shan Association building and temple from historic Kula, Maui, can be seen together with a garden demonstrating a great variety of Chinese vegetables and rices. Kula is near the Sun family ranch where Sun Yatsen stayed for several years.

SALUTE TO GLADYS WADDINGHAM who has just celebrated her 94th birthday!! She and her late husband Francis were among the first in the City's historical establishment to recognize and accept the young Chinese Historical Society almost 20 years ago. She continues to promote and announce our events in the Centinela Valley and the Westside, including our Evergreen Shrine project, our just introduced Chinatown Heritage and Visitors Center, and the Moon Festival. She invited everyone to our Sept. 10 BBQ. Thank you, Gladys, and continued happy returns.


