

Building Committee Report: CHINATOWN HERITAGE & VISITORS CENTER - ESCROW CLOSED!! Mark this historic date on your calendar: January 31, 1995. That's the date that escrow closed and we acquired our new home at historic 411-415 Bernard Street. The CHSSC has been providing educational programs for the community for nearly twenty years, and we are serving notice that we intend to continue our work for many more years!

<u>Thanks</u>. The escrow closing would not have been possible without the valuable contributions of time and money from many. Elsewhere in this and past newsletters we have tried to list all of the donors, and we will continue to do so. If we miss a name, please let us know. Every donation has been a valuable boost to help us achieve our escrow closing. The Building Committee gratefully acknowledges the generous support of these donors.

Fundraising/involvement. The property, containing 10,000 square feet of commercially-zoned land including two historic homes, was purchased for \$375,000 with 5% down and a five year note from the seller, with interest-only, quarterly payments in the first year. There is a modest surplus from initial donations for initial payments. Fundraising efforts are continuing with assistance from the fundraising co-chairs, Ken Chan and Nadine Levy, and from our Advisory Board. Grant applications are being prepared with the assistance of Lynn Kronzek, Susie Ling, and other Building Committee members. The Building Committee is also continuing discussions with government officials toward long term financing.

However, the success of our effort depends greatly on the involvement of many more individuals who believe in the project. If you share in our vision of a community heritage center, and would like to help the Building Committee in one of the many exciting facets of developing the center, please join us at the next Building Committee meeting: Saturday April 8 at 10:00 AM, at the CHSSC office at 969 N. Broadway, upstairs above the Phoenix Bakery. Some special skills we are looking for include word processing/desktop publishing, exhibit design, still/video photography, property maintenance (electrical, plumbing, landscape), and budget management. Fund management. A number of inquiries have been made as to the legal ownership of the property and the management of funds for the project, and we would like to clarify the status for the benefit of members and donors. The Chinese Historical Society of Southern California (CHSSC), a California non-profit corporation, is the owner on record of 411-415 Bernard Street. The CHSSC Treasurer established a new account, the CHSSC Building Fund, specifically for the Los Angeles Chinatown Heritage & Visitors Center project.

All donations to the CHSSC Building Fund are tax deductible because the CHSSC is a tax-exempt organization under Sec. 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Building Fund will not be co-mingled with the CHSSC's other accounts under Board adopted policy. The Building Fund is administered by the Building Committee under a budget approved by the CHSSC Board of Directors. Most members of the Building Committee and Board of Directors have been long term, dues-paying, and actively participating members of the CHSSC, some since its founding in 1975-1976. We anticipate a dedicated effort by these, and hopefully many more, committed CHSSC members, in the years ahead to achieve the educational goals of the CHSSC and the Chinatown Heritage & Visitors Center.

Feb. 18 Open House/Boutique. On the day of the Golden Dragon parade in L.A. Chinatown, Building Committee members held an Open House/Boutique to raise funds and generate public awareness of our project. Space and time limitations preclude a full report at this time, but special thanks are due to Doreen and Ben Nakayama for organizing and managing this effort.

Chinese Pioneers in the Northwest - 1995 WCAAS/IEC field Trip and Tour, October 1-3. This two day, one night adventure into northeastern Oregon will feature a visit to the world-renowned Kam Wah Chung and Company Museum in John Day. Its isolated location has helped preserve this fully-furnished Chinese store, herbal medicine shop, and living quarters dating to the late 19th and 20th centuries. The tour will also stop at a Chinese cemetery and explore two unique archaeological sites created by mid-to late 19th century Chinese placer miners. One, called the "Chinese Walls," comprises some 60 acres of hand-stacked, wall-like, rock tailings. The other, at Union Creek, has an impressive three-tiered, rock-walled, water delivery channel, originally fed by two earthen dams.

The trip fee is \$139.00 based on double-occupancy motel rooms. The tour agent will try to match singles with roommates unless they prefer to pay an additional \$20.00 for single accommodations. Included: services of experienced and knowledgeable tour leader and assistant; transportation by luxury tour bus (toilet, VCR) between Lewiston, Idaho and John Day, Oregon and return; one night's lodging; and admission to the Kam Wah Chung and Company Museum. Not included: meals, gratuity to bus driver (optional).

Tour leader will be Dr. Priscilla Wegars, editor of Hidden Heritage: Historical Archaeology of the Overseas Chinese, and founder of the Asian American Comparative collection in the Alfred W. Bowers Laboratory of Anthropology at the University of Idaho in Moscow, Idaho. Dr. Wegars has conducted extensive research into the history of the Chinese in the Northwest and has directed several archaeological survey and excavation projects of Chinese sites in Oregon and Idaho. This course may be offered for 1 unit of credit through Lewis-Clark State College at an additional fee.
