FRANKLIN NG TO SPEAK - The January 3, 1996 regular meeting of the Chinese Historical Society of Southern California will be a joint meeting with the Friends of the Chinatown Library to hear Dr. Franklin Ng, Editor-in-Chief of the recently published Asian American Encyclopedia. This six volume encyclopedia with more than 2,000 entries is the "first reference book of its kind encompassing six of the largest Asian American groups (Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Filipino, Asian Indian and Vietnamese) as well as Pacific Islander and other smaller groups.


