Hans Van Tilburg earned his masters degree at East Carolina University in Maritime History and Nautical Archaeology. He is currently an instructor for the Marine Options Program at the University of Hawaii at Manoa.

LEO POLITI - By now, it is generally known that artist Leo Politi, the Cultural Treasure and Icon of Bunker Hill, Chinatown, and El Pueblo, passed away recently at 87. Everyone seems to have a Leo Politi story and this includes many of the long time residents and shopkeepers in Chinatown, who saw him frequently around town and got to know him. He, of course, immortalized one litle Chinese girl, Moy, Moy, in one of his famous children's books, often based on the neighborhood most familiar to him. Chinatown is graced by one of his artistic works, the 1977 mural of children which can be seen in an inner courtyard of Castelar School. As recently as two years ago, Mr. Politi made his final grand effort to retouch the vast Biscauluz Building mural at El Pueblo, and with trepidation and awe, Suellen Cheng and her staff colleagues found themselves assisting, as he was too weak then to complete the less critical parts of the job. Dr. Bill Chun-Hoon remembers him best and spoke of him at the public ceremonies (and celebration) of April 22 at El Pueblo, where several Castelar children also performed in honor of his memory.

<u>'MULTICULTURAL MANNERS"</u> - Member Norine Dresser has just published her newest book, a manual for survival in the new Los Angeles. Proposed Bylaws Revisions

Amended in Board Motion 03/20/96. By: Munson Kwok

BYLAWS

Article VII, New Section 3b and 3c.

- b. The First Vice President shall assume the duties of the President in the event of absence, incapacity or resignation of the President. This Officer shall assist the President as directed.
- c. The Vice President for Programs shall chair the Program Committee. This officer shall be responsible for the development of all programs for the Society, including educational programs.

Article VII, New Section 3d.

d. The Vice President for Development shall be responsible for the development of all major capital projects and assets of the Society. This officer has the chief responsibility for major fundraising in support of development efforts.

Article VII, New Section 3e.

e. The Vice President for Operations shall be responsible for the daily operations of the Society's administration and projects. This officer shall have oversight responsibilities for the Archives, Historical Research and Recognition, Outreach, and Publications Committees. This officer shall develop personnel requirements and shall supervise paid and voluntary administrative staff.

Article VII, New Section 3... (labelling only).

f. Secretary; g. Treasurer; h. Financial Secretary; i. Membership Secretary; j. All officers shall perform other duties as provided by the bylaws or as required by the Board of Directors.

Article VII, Section 1. Officers.

- a. In order of succession, the officers shall be, the President, First Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer.
- b.(1). The President, First Vice President, and Secretary can serve for a maximum of two (2) consecutive service periods...

Article VI, Section 1. Qualifications and Composition.

When taking office, members of the Board of Directors must be Society members in good standing. The officers and directors-at-large together shall constitute the Board of Directors.

Article VI, Section 2. Number.

The Board of Directors shall consist of no less than thirteen (13) members and no more than nineteen (19) members.

Article VI, Add Section 8. Restriction on Interested Persons as Directors.

No more than 49% of the persons serving on the Board of Directors may be interested persons. An interested person is (a) any person compensated by the corporation for services rendered to it within the last 12 months, whether as a full-time or part-time employee, independent contractor, or otherwise, excluding any reasonable compensation paid to a Director as a Director; and (b) any brother, sister, ancestor, descendant, spouse, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, daughter-in-law, mother-in-law or father-in-law of such a person. However, any violation of the provisions of this paragraph shall not affect the validity or enforceability of any transaction entered into by the corporation.

Article VI, Add Section 9. Compensation and Reimbursement

Directors and members of committees may receive such compensation, if any, for their services and such reimbursement of expenses, as directors or officers, as the Board may determine by resolution to be just and reasonable to the corporation at the time that the resolution is adopted. The resolution is to be passed by a two-thirds vote of the full Board of Directors.

STANDING RULES

NEW ARTICLE IV. RULES FOR THE VICE PRESIDENT for DEVELOPMENT.

A <u>major</u> capital project or asset is construed to be one exceeding \$5,000 in the aggregate. A <u>major</u> fundraiser is construed to be one exceeding a projected gross of \$15,000.

The 13-year-old Jacoby Award is the International Student Center's highest honor. Named after Neil H.
