NEH SPONSORED SUMMER SEMINAR SERIES:

With the receipt of a National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) Focus Grant, the Cal State L.A. School of Arts and Letters and Asian and Asian American Studies Program are conducting a faculty seminar this summer on the subject of "The Chinese Diaspora in Southern California: Culture, Ethnicity, Community, and Asian American Studies." Out of 50 applicants, Cal State L.A. (CSLA) received one of only 8 grants awarded nationally. The purpose of the NEH Focus Grant program is to provide opportunities for small groups of faculty to develop their understanding of important topics in the humanities and, if they choose, to translate that understanding into plans of action for their institutions. The CSLA seminar is focused on curricular development for a fututre Asian American Studies Program. Three public lectures are scheduled and are open to any interested people. 
