OLVERA STREET and CHINA CITY:

Imagined and Contested Space

Olvera Street and China City were created in the 1930s by Christine Sterling and City boosters. As a tourist landscape, Olvera Street and China City pitted a timeless, romantic, homogeneous Spanish, Mexican, and Chinese culture against industrialization, immigration, urban decay and modernity itself. The discontinuity that Sterling found in the present and the continuity she wished to restore were connected by virtue of their location in a single urban geography adjacent to the Plaza, the oldest and most historic section of Los Angeles.

William Estrada is a native of Los Angeles. He is curator at El Pueblo de Los Angeles Historical Monument and is completing his Ph.D. in History at UCLA. His presentation to the CHSSC is based on his dissertation: The Los Angeles Plaza: Myth, Memory, Symbol, and the Struggle for Place in a Changing Metropolis.

The FRIENDS OF THE CHINATOWN LIBRARY and the CHINESE HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA invite you to meet Clarence Lee, the designer of the United States Postal Service Lunar New Year stamps at the Castelar School multipurpose room on TUESDAY, JANUARY 5, 1999 at 7:00 p.m.

Clarence Lee was commissioned by the United States Postal Service to design the complete set of 12 Lunar New Year stamps. This year's commemorative stamp, the Year of the Hare, will be dedicated earlier in the day in a ceremony at 10 a.m. in Los Angeles Chinatown, Central Plaza, Sun Yat Sen statue. The special meeting in the evening at Castelar School will give you the opportunity to hear about his personal experiences in creating these stamps.

The Hare stamp is the 7th commemorative stamp in the series. The other Lunar stamps and the city where the first day of issue was held include: Rooster (San Francisco), Dog (Pomona), Boar (Sacramento), Rat (San Francisco), Ox (Honolulu), and Tiger (Seattle).

There is the notion that the younger generation is not aware or appreciative of the contributions and sacrifives of their forbears. In a way, we can't fault them, given the many distractions in our society today. Hopefully, through your project and publication they will realize that we, Chinese American Veterans of WWII, and others did our duty not only to save our country from tyrannical domination but to make this a better country for all its citizens. This is our legacy.

America is still a great country with all its imperfections but each of us can be what-Ever we want to be given our talents and determination. That, in a nutshell, is what we fought for. I pray it will not be in vain.

Sorry, Marjorie, but this long discourse. This is whow I fel in retrospet. I'm glad my parents came to America with all the early hardshis they endured but life has improved with each succeeding generation. I hope we all playe a part in it as WWII veterans but more importantly as Chinese American parents and grandparents in American society.

NORTH BROADWAY RESURFACING PROJECT to begin December 28, 1998. Councilmember Mike Hernandez informs us that Chinatown will have a newly resurfaced street on North Broadway between College Street and Cesar Chavez Avenue in time for Chinese New Year – Year of the Hare - on Feb. 16, 1999. The project should approximately take 2 weeks to complete.

FIELD TRIP TO THE GOLDEN SPIKE NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE, UTAH
The Chinese Historic Society of Southern California is planning another field trip to
Promontory Summit, UT for the annual re-enactment of the completion of the
Transcontinental railroad, on Monday May 10, 1999.

Bill Chew has volunteered to be the project leader and is organizing a group of families and friends to attend this historic event which recognizes the first contribution of the Chinese railroad workers of the Central Pacific.

There are three optional travel plans which are briefly described below.

- 1) Air-Rail-Auto Plan: Fly from LAX to Sacramento, drive to Colfax, overnight stay and tour "Cape Horn", Amtrak train Colfax to Salt Lake, rent car drive to Ogden for lunch stop and visit "Union Station" depot museum, hotel stay in Brigham City, GS Historic Site Celebration, return to SLC and fly back to L. A.
- 2) Air-Auto Plan: The tentative plan is to fly to Salt Lake City on the morning of May 9. Rent cars / vans at airport, drive / lunch stop and tour the Chinese murals and statue at "Union Station" in Ogden, drive to Brigham City, stay one night, attend the ceremonies and return to LAX Monday evening or Tuesday. Each party shall be responsible for his own expenses.
- 3) Colfax Only: Drive your car with a group to Colfax for weekend with many historic events and return to L.A. (or maybe a side trip to Tahoe?)
