Lucy Wang is always asked the same questions by strangers walking down the street, at the airport and on a cab ride down New York City: Where are you from REALLY? But the real question is: How did a Wall Street bond trader become a playwright? Answer: With a lot of soul searching and fearless fights.

Born in Taiwan, raised in Ohio and moved to New York City is the American Dream in the bigger picture, but the sacrifices could not just be omitted in Lucy's story about finding herself in ballet shoes and joining drama club. Wanted to be a performer at a young age came to the realization of how discriminatory acting is in the real world with mission statement of equal opportunity backlash to a simple statement "You are lucky to be here in America while the children in China are starving." And going along with the charade she was typecasted as the bowing china doll in Nutcracker. Her parents warned her but like any child part of learning is to experience first hand.

Right brain turned left, she studied math and science, then in later years majored in Finance and got a MBA then found herself in the Big Apple. It was the support of her father which got her career going and hard work does pay off for the 22 years old. Then came the stock market crash which turned her world upside down where highlight of the day was lunchtime around the corner. And a lying boss giving the other guy the bonuses for his car collections of porches and corvettes.

Is this what all this hard work has come to? When her father was laid off a year before getting his pension slaps in place, she came to another realization that she has to quit her job as a bond trader as crazy as it seems without another job at hand. She later found a job at City Hall and bet with fate on the 1994 Mayor election where she tells herself if Dinkins looses she will become a writer. In the hopes of turning her fate around, a writer was born at last, but it wasn't that easy with a MBA in Finance on the resume. Getting publishers to read her drafts was a toll booth line moving slowly. While persuing writing screenplays she wrote business and financial articles to make a living. Later on she taught writing at University of Southern California, Ohio State University and the American Conservatory Theater in San Francisco. Her big break came into place in an anthology written by Asian Americans.

In final thoughts, she gave people like me encouragement and hope. "Write what you know." That is the best advice given. Junk Bonds, her lastest work, is about -- yes -- stock market.

Her thoughts toward her father's mistreatment is a step in emphasizing that any ordinary person or any ordinary family could be subjected to what had happened to her father and her family. Her family came to the media existence when her father was charged with a 59-count indictment and held in solitary confinement for nine months. She became her family's spokesperson travelling around the nation speaking to news media and Asian communities. In her heart this was not an act of heroism, but her duty as a daughter to put a light to her father as a person and a father.
