September Meeting: A Celebration of Film Shorts and Birthday

This month's meeting was a great turnout with enthusiasm from the crowd celebrating Tyrus Wong's 90th birthday. Tyrus shared stories about his working on Walt Disney's Bambi for 3 years and skipping classes as a kid. Now he is a kite maker flying his 150-foot long centipede north of the Santa Monica Pier changing the landscape of Los Angeles.

The audiences were also treated with two documentary film shorts produced by Suellen Cheng, Leslee See Leong, and Beulah Quo. The producers talked about their experiences in working on the project and with a group of talented people in putting it together. The project started four years ago without any funding, but with a lot of dedication and volunteers anything can be done. The first short were interviews with Gilbert Leong and Tyrus Wong telling their stories about Los Angeles, Angel Island, growing up in California and their 50 years long friendship. The second short was about the history of Dragon's Den and how it came about becoming a part of Chinatown's history. It was a wonderful evening with personal stories and memories.

Lucy Wang comes to us from the Los Angeles Public Library --"L.A. Writes," a series of new authors presenting literary and cultural experiences throughout the Los Angeles metropolitan area. It is supported by a grant from the Ralph M. Parsons Foundation.
