Following a brief rainstorm, Saturday, February 22nd, was a cold, clear day in downtown Los Angeles. In this refreshing setting, beneath a constellation of red lanterns, the traditional Chinese Lantern Festival was held in El Pueblo Monument's plaza from 1:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. The Chinese American Museum and El Pueblo Monument cohosted the event. Co-sponsors were Evergreen Publishing and Stationery and 14th District Councilmember, Nick Pacheco. The Festival was partly funded by a Los Angeles Cultural Affairs Grant.

Festival participants were joined by many unintentional -but altogether delighted - visitors who continuously streamed into the plaza from Olvera Street. Many CHSSC members attended the event. Society members Linda Wong Smith and Icy Smith generously gave their time, reading to children in the Festival's storytelling booth. Other instructional and participatory booths included calligraphy, origami, lantern making, kite making, Chinese knotting, face painting, and paper cutting. A booth from the Los Angeles Sparks women's basketball team added a celebrity presence.

Against this backdrop of children busily engaged in the booths and workshops, the scheduled program began with the Southern California Senior Chorus - its ladies resplendent in floor length, red gowns. The Chorus turned the Plaza's gazebo into an impromptu band shell, delivering a rousing "God Bless America" and its version of "Yankee Doodle" - in Chinese! There were a martial arts demonstration, a Chinese drum team, a hip hop band and a magic dragon performance. An award was presented for the most creative lantern designed by a child and the Lantern Parade capped the day's festivities.

Noticeably, very few items were being sold at the Festival. Perhaps this educational emphasis, and the many enriching workshops, were what made Lantern Festival 2003 so appealing.

CAPP TRAVELS TO STOCKTON

A small CHSSC contingent journeyed north: Dr. Mar and his wife, Joyce; Bill and Natalina Chew; and, Gene Moy and his wife, Susan and son, Bernie. Our group was cordially greeted at Stockton's Memorial Civic Auditorium by CCSS President, Ed Soon, Vice President, Francis Lau, and past president, Gladys Ikeda. We were given a prime location in the entrance lobby where the 29 CAPP portraits were displayed.

The opening celebration featured a dual, red and white lion dance which circulated through the audience to the many vendors and service organizations around the auditorium's circumference. The auditorium's alcoves featured a cultural village with an Imperial Tea Pavillon, children's craft corner, Chinese cooking demonstration, food court, and even mah jong lessons. In addition to continuous entertainment, a formal program included greetings from local political leaders and retired Judge, Frank Kim. Dr. Chen F. Liem, a renowned cardiologist, was honored as the Outstanding Citizen of the Year. The affair was tremendously successful; the Stockton Record reported on the diverse crowd and acknowledged our CAPP display, honoring the achievements of Chinese Americans in medicine, science, and aerospace. Local television station, KVIE, interviewed Dr. Wing Mar for that evening's news broadcast.

We thank Stockton resident and CHSSC member, Sylvia Sun Minnick - author of a book on the history of Stockton's Chinese community - for sharing her book sale table where we sold a good number of our own book, Bridging The Centuries. We also thank the Chinese Cultural Society of Stockton for inviting us to participate in this wonderful event, and for hosting us at a delicious dinner of original home-cooked dishes at King's House Restaurant, following the festival.

THE CHOLESTEROL PARADOX - PART II

How to Lower Your Elevated Cholesterol

- Moderate exercise;
- Eat a balanced diet with increase leafy vegetables for their nutrients, fiber and anti-oxidants. Oxidized fats lead to CVD;
- Avoid all trans-fats from hydrogenated (synthetic) vegetable oils;
- Reduce saturated animal fats:
- Limit alcohol intake and high cholesterol foods;
- Lose weight to maintain your ideal weight for your height;
- Eat lean meats, increase seafood and fish with their rich omega 3/6 oils, and remember shellfish and fish are high quality protein, have very low saturated fats and prevent platelet stickiness which forms the blood clots in CVD. This is true for the vegetarians of the sea: the oysters, clams, scallops and mussels and other shellfish such as shrimp, lobster and crab. Read "The New American Diet System," written by the Connors, two excellent nutritionists, and, also "The Framingham Heart Study: Seafood and Your Heart," by William Castelli, M.D.;
- If you are prescribed any Statin drug (Altace, Lescol, Lipitor, Pravachol, Zocor, etc.), be very watchful for any side effects such as muscle-joint pains, headaches, nausea, neuropathy such as electrical "shocks" running down the legs, numbness, tingling in the hands or feet, and memory loss!;
- Alternative medicine employs foods, herbs, supplements, vitamins and minerals, which do not have the side effects of man-made drugs. Bitter Melon, Gurmar (Gynema sylvestre), red yeast rice, Policosanol (which works for me), Guggulipid (Commiphora mukul), soy protein, garlic, curcumin (turmeric root), omega 3 fish oil, green tea, artichoke leaf extract, conjugated linoleic acid, fiber such as fenugreek, bran, flax seed, chitosal, psyllium (not to be taken with digitalis or nitrofurantoin); Vitamin E, niacin, and Stevia as a no calorie sweetener;
- Stress Management, since stress produces cortisol, and cortisol produces fat;
- Get adequate sleep of eight hours each night;
- Monitor your lipid profile regularly after age 40 years, at least yearly; every five years from ages 20-39 years and ask your physician to test Homocysteine, C-reactive protein/CRP (marker for inflammation, and initiator of CVD), Fibrinogen (too much leads to clots), as well;
- Be proactive in your health care and protect your liver from steatohepatitis (fat deposits from obesity), alcohol and viral hepatitis;
- Always work with your knowledgeable physician who is your health consultant and get second opinions as necessary;

Traditional Chinese medicine always stresses balance; so too in our diet as related to cholesterol profile, a balance of food and lifestyle is the key to optimum health. For more information, visit www.lef.org, and reference Life Extension's DISEASE PREVENTION AND TREATMENT.
