Minimum overall cumulative GPA of 3.0. Academic emphasis related to Chinese American studies in the humanities or social sciences.

Complete application packet to include 4 copies of all the following:

- a) 2007 Scholarship Application Form;
- b) Research paper approximately 1000-3000 word;
- c) Personal essay approximately 300-500 word;
- d) Copy of transcripts since high school; and
- e) Letters of recommendation. (optional)

March 23, 2007, Friday, 1:00 pm at 411 Bernard Street, Los Angeles, CA 90012. Finalists to be available for interview on April 14, 2007, Saturday, in Los Angeles' Chinatown (travel expenses to be paid by applicants).

SUPPORTING DOCUMENTS

- 1. Research Paper. This 1000 to 3000-word paper may be original or have been previously submitted for a class. Please do not include instructor's comments. It may be beneficial to explain the parameters of the class assignment. CHSSC prefers papers related to Chinese American themes.
- 2. This paper will not be the only factor in evaluating the Scholarship application. CHSSC would like permission from the Scholarship winner to publish the article in the Gum Saan Journal.
- 3. Personal Essay. Three- to five-hundred word biographical essay discussing the importance of Chinese American studies to you. Please include information about financial need, family circumstance, employment history, and campus/community activities that will help us to decide in your favor. Discuss your future plans and ambitions.
- 4. Transcripts. Please include all post-high school transcripts. Photocopies are acceptable.

The Society has launched the 2007 edition of its scholarly Gum Saan Journal! This special edition of Gum Saan Journal has plenty of karma; it was definitely meant to be. It all began when member Dolores Wong asked if we might be interested in a speech that Richard Wing, famous restauranteur, had sent to her. She got a copy because of the connection that Judge Wong was born in Hanford. The speech was accompanied by some special historical photos of Wing and General George Marshall during World War II.

Then things began to snowball. At about the same time, the news came that the Wing family restaurant, Imperial Dynasty, was going to close. National Public Radio even did a very nice segment on this piece of Americana. So I thought I had to call and ask to interview Richard Wing; he most graciously agreed!

Camille Wing is one of those special people; she gave us a tour of Hanford's Taoist Temple and Confucian School and helped us extensively with this issue. The Wings showed me a March 1983 issue of the local paper that had intensely researched the history of Chinese Americans in Kings County. Hanford Sentinel didn't hesitate to allow us to excerpt much of Karen Clark's work.

The last piece came in to complete the puzzle: Hollywood agent Bessie Loo was also born in Hanford and our own Jack Ong had interviewed Bessie some time ago. He was most happy to now write a piece on his mentor.

I've never seen an issue come in so logically, so smoothly, and so fast. Our Board's enthusiastic support was heard loud and clear. Would you believe the current mayor of Hanford, Dan Chin, even helped us out?

As usual, our professional editor, Icy Smith, puts the finishing touches on the Journal that makes us all proud. You really have to appreciate her attention to detail coupled with great artistry. CHSSC Lifetime Member, Mr. Johnny Yee was recently in Hong Kong for the 61st Anniversary of VJ Day and to lay a wreath and to hoist an American flag during the Hong Kong Veteran's Day ceremony. A WWII Navy Veteran, Yee saw front line action in the Pacific theatre as a Gunner's Mate First Class. During WWII, Yee's elder brother Swan was also posted in the Pacific. Yee's younger brothers, Joe, Johnson, and Chuck (founding CHSSC member and past President) had also been in the service post WWII. After WWII. Yee joined the Merchant Marines and served during the Korean War and Vietnam Wars. During the 90-minute solemn ceremony, Yee, sitting in the front row of the VIP section facing the war memorial, was greeted by scores of dignitaries and fellow veterans. Though the Hong Kong Police Band was playing music most of the time, Yee was overheard humming "God Bless America" with a sly grin on his face.

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REVIEW OF DECEMBER PROGRAM

Bitter Roots



Angi Ma Wong gave a reading of Bitter Roots: a Gum Saan Odyssey written by her mother-in-law's brother, the late Arthur W. Chung, M.D.

He wrote about his family, about aspects of immigrant life not often known, about how the opportunity and money for the passage to California were obtained, and other rich details.

Bitter Roots refers to the experiences of the author's grandfather Yee Hay and his wife Chan See, the hostility, heartbreak, disappointment and discrimination. Yee Hay worked in laundries and chop suey joints in San Francisco, and in the brutal heat of the Mojave desert dynamiting mountains for borax wagons and railroads.

In January of 2005, excavation for the MTA Gold Line encountered human remains in the Chinese section of Los Angeles County potter's field. Yee Hay's descendants believe that his remain is among those uncovered and they are determined to find his grave.

Arthur Chung traveled to China to pursue his medical studies, returning to the U. S. to continue at Harvard Medical School, New York's Bellevue Hospital and later became the Assistant Director of the World Health Organization in Geneva. Dr. Chung wrote his first book at age 82 after he retired

The publisher of Bitter Roots is Pacific Heritage Books.

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HISTORICAL CHINATOWNS

Chinese Camp—Tuolumne County, California

The Chinese Camp in Toulumne County of California is not to be confused with China Camp State Park in Marin County, California. The Chinese Camp is located on Highway 49.

The text on the tablet reads:

"Reportedly founded about 1849 by group of Englishmen who employed Chinese as miners. Much surface gold found on hills and flats. Headquarters for stage lines in early 1850's, and for several California Chinese mining companies. First Chinese Tong War in State fought near here between Sam Yap and Yan Woo Tongs. Present stone and brick post office build 1854, still standing. St. Francis Xavier Catholic church built 1855, restored 1949. First Pastor, father Henry Aleric

Historical Landmark No. 423

Tablet placed by California Centennials Commission

Base provided by Tuolumne County Council No. 2165, Knights of Columbus

Dedicated June 19, 1949"

Chinese Camp was first known as "Camp

Washington" or "Washingtonville." The very first Chinese laborers arrived in 1849 and the area started to become known as "Chinee" or "Chinese Camp" or "Chinese Diggings." At one point the town had an estimated 5,000 Chinese residents.

In 1849 some thirty-five Chinese miners from Canton arrived at Camp Salvado, the first mining camp in this area. It was named for Salvadorians working the placers. The Chinese workers began prospecting successfully. How these workers arrived is still a mystery. Eventually they were pushed out by white miners. The Chinese miners were willing to work harder and for less return than the white miners. Their patience and industriousness paid off in good wages on claims abandoned by other miners.

The current Chinese Camp School is very distinctive, designed by Dolores Nicolini in the style of a Chinese pagoda. This school has been in operation since 1970. This building was lost in a fire on May 4, 2006. The fire was caused by carelessness on the part of several local people.

Despite its name, Chinese Camp was equally well populated by whites at its heyday in the 1850s. The placer mines of this area are credited with producing \$2.5 million in gold.
