This program will unveil the first in a series of documentary shorts to be produced by the CHSSC about life in Los Angeles's Chinatown during the 1930s and 1940s. Created by the society's current UCLA interns, this documentary short was produced as part of the society's newly established, Chinatown Remembered Oral History Project.

Over the course of the last 8 weeks, the project interns, Jennifer Tang, Scott Chan, James Lee and Nancy Thai worked closely with prominent Chinese Americans who lived in Los Angeles during the 1930s and 1940s. These residents: David Lee, Jennie Taylor, Charlie Quon and Peter Soo Hoo Jr., shared their life histories and memories with the interns who then edited their stories down into a short video project.

The interns will discuss their work on the project. Project director and CHSSC board member, Will Gow, will also speak about the importance of working now to preserve our communities' history.

We have had outreach booths at the Moon Festival, Lunar New Year Celebration, Heritage Festival at Long Beach, Cherry Blossom Festival in Little Tokyo, Boeing's Pacific Asian Heritage Celebration, Museum of Natural History's Pacific Asian Culture Celebration, and at a birthday celebration for the city of Los Angeles.

On the practical side we still need off site storage so we can dedicate the space we have at 415 Bernard to exhibit, meeting, and public space. We are still looking for contributions of air conditioners, video projectors, flat computer monitors, and cash. There is still need to repair the archive building roof, resealing our skylight, and repairing or replacing our cracked driveway.

We have accomplished much but we can accomplish much more. As I leave this office please know that I am not leaving my enthusiasm for the mission of the Society. There is a history to be remembered, a history to be told, and a history yet to be established. In his lighthearted, humorous manner, Jeff narrated scenes from his soon to be published book, *Once Upon a Time on Dragon Mountain*, presented in power point images by Eugene Moy, CHSSC VP of Programs.

F.Chow Chan, was the founder of East West Bank, Cathay Bank, and Phoenix Bakery which became an icon in Los Angeles Chinatown. For about a decade Chan organized the Chinese American community to apply for a bank charter. The application to begin a savings and loan was turned down two or three times by California State regulators. Finally, Preston Martin advised that Chan and his associates apply for a commercial bank instead and thus Cathay Bank was started.



It is a shocking, unsettling, and virtually unexplored chapter of American history. In this eye-opening, disturbing, and
