A video screening of "A Chinatown Banquet"

Mike Blockstein is the creator, lead artist and educator of *A Chinatown Banquet*, a community-based public art and education project about the forces which shaped and continue to influence Boston Chinatown. This project explores the intersections of artistic process and civic engagement. Mike's interdisciplinary projects utilize a "sense of place" as a mechanism to address social, cultural and built environments. Below is a quote from Mike:

"I have been working on this project in various stages for 6 years in partnership with the Asian Community Development Corporation. The project has involved work with high school students who worked in a curriculum that blended art, design, and new media with urbanism, history and leadership development."

Mike has a Masters of Public Administration from Harvard's Kennedy School of Government . He is currently leading a Los Angeles organization that brings together artists, urban planners, architects and oral historians to work with youth and young adults in projects that explore neighborhood history, character and context.

## Message from the President of CHSSC

If you haven't toured Chinatown recently, you probably wouldn't recognize it. The changes in the last twenty years has been truly amazing let alone in the past one hundred years. It certainly isn't your father's Chinatown; it most definitely is not your grandfather's Chinatown. Chinatown was a haven for Chinese immigrants escaping the discrimination of the larger society and a place to find a warm, friendly face in a strange land.

Time has seen changes in the purpose of having a Chinatown. It is still a familiar face in a strange land, but it also has become a real estate heaven, a developer's opportunity, and money in the bank. What began as an immigrant's first stop in America has become an investment paradise. What was once a neighborhood of low cost rentals, restaurants, and curio shops has become the home of restaurants converted to Jazz Clubs, fashionable café eateries, and a growing gallery of respectable art adventures.

Chinatown has become a "Concept". Though it still serves it's original raison d'être, it has now become an institution, a destination, a sort of living history. Its story has seen many chapters since the arrival of the first immigrants and for recent immigrants the story is still being written. I would predict that Chinatown will look very much different within the next thirty years and change in ways we never thought possible. It is not a question of whether change is good or bad, the question should be how will we adapt to it.

# Nineteenth Century Los Angeles Chinese Pioneers Honored at Ch'ing Ming Ceremony

CHSSC's commemoration of the springtime rite Ch'ing Ming or "pure brightness" (Chinese Memorial Day) was the most historically accurate and colorful event to date at the restored 1888 Chinese Memorial Shrine. About 80 people, including elected officials, attended the event in Evergreen Cemetery on the afternoon of March 31, 2007. This year marks the 10-year anniversary of restoration of the Shrine which the Society saved from demolition and continues to own and maintain.

It was the fifth time the Society has observed Ch'ing Ming Festival there and the first such event presided over by a legitimate Taoist master and two associates (ritual masters), all clad in the vibrant and beautiful raiment of the tradition. The Taoist priests placed ceremonial wine, gold chrysanthemums, and incense before the common memorial stone (stele), and chanted for an extended period. Master E Man's and his assistants' participation greatly enhanced the program.

Irvin Lai, community elder, activist, leader and two-time former CHSSC President presided over the event. Beginning about 1992, Mr. Lai co-led the preservation and restoration of the historic Evergreen Cemetery Chinese shrine, including negotiating its purchase, overseeing the creation of a boundary fence and retaining wall, and orchestrating the Shrine's restoration.

Board of Equalization member Judy Chu, a longtime supporter of CHSSC's community efforts, presented a commendation. Assemblyman Mike Eng representing San Gabriel Valley area and Councilman Ed Reyes representing Chinatown both praised the Society's longtime efforts in the community and presented a certificate of appreciation.

Shrine Committee Chair Randy Bloch detailed the history of the nineteenth-century Chinese cemetery and the Chinese Memorial Shrine. Ann Lau, a founding CHSSC member and former Vice-President—delivered a poem by Tang Dynasty poet, Du Mu, titled "Ch'ing Ming." In keeping with tradition a feast of roast pork and dim sum was served to feed those paying respects and those departed.

CHSSC has sharply criticized the MTA for delays in notifying the Chinese community of these finds, and has presented the agency with a formal list of demands. (Please see: http://www.chssc.org/currentevents.shtml.)

After almost two years of public meetings, MTA has agreed to carry out a dignified re-interment of the remains and artifacts, erect fitting memorials, and to hold a formal ceremony attended by public officials that will commemorate the re-interments and acknowledge what took place. The reburial ceremony is scheduled for August 11, 2007 in Evergreen Cemetery at a yet to be determined location. Many in the Society believe the rightful spot should be adjacent to the Chinese Memorial Shrine.

Mr. Lai emphasized that the Chinese pioneers who built the railroad and worked in agriculture contributed significantly to the development of California. They deserve dignity in burial.

Correction—the correction in the April 2007 issue of News 'n Notes was not called for as the original statement as published in March 2007 is correct. It rightly stated that there were Chinese known to be buried at the Evergreen Cemetery.

### **Books on Chinese Americans**

CHINESE HEART OF TEXAS; The San Antonio Community 1875-1975 by Mel Brown received a 2007 Citation of Publishing Excellence from the San Antonio Conservation Society on March 27, 2007. The book is the story of why and how the Chinese came to Texas a few years after the American Civil War. The author talked about what enabled the Chinese immigrants to stay in San Antonio at a time when they were being driven out of many other places in the United States. This book was published in 2005, including over 80 photos in eight chapters which chronologically explore the facts, fictions, myths, legends, personalities and places that make up the first century of the Chinese experience in Texas. The author is a fifth generation Texan but claims to be also Chinese American by way of more than 30 years of marriage.

The Opium Debate and Chinese Exclusion Laws in the Nineteenth-Century American West by Diana L. Ahmad was published in March 2007 by the University of Nevada Press. The author gives an analysis of the evolution of the Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882, plus important insights into the social history of the nineteenth-century West, and racism in American politics. Ahmad examines how the spread of opium-smoking fueled racism and created demands for the removal of the Chinese from American life. A Thousand Miles of Dreams: The Journeys of Two Chinese Sisters is an intimate biography by Sasha Su-Ling Welland. Welland is the granddaughter and grandniece of the two sisters. One of them arrived in Cleveland in 1925 and studied medicine. The other sister became a famous writer of short fiction in Beijing. This is the story of two trailblazing women who took different paths in their quest for independent lives.
