The David and Pearl Louie Family Foundation / CHSSC ScholarshipWinners

Three volunteer judges took much of their personal time to read The David and Pearl Louie Foundation/CHSSC scholarship applications and interviewed six candidates. The judges are Dr. Edward Park of Loyola Marymount University, Dr. Xiao-huang Yin of Occidental College and Professor John Delloro of the Los Angeles Community College District.

Proposed exhibition on Chinese contribution to the San Fernando Valley Tunnel at Newhall Pass

The very first Martial Art Museum in the United Stated opened in Santa Clarita. Its founder and President is Michael Matsuda. He has asked CHSSC to collaborate with him on an exhibition on Chinese contribution to the construction of San Fernando Tunnel. This was a very difficult and dangerous project of the Central Pacific Railroad. The Martial Art Museum is a cultural and community center, with exhibitions on Asian art, history, and culture. CHSSC has participated in the Centennial and Quasquicentennial (125th) celebration of the Golden Spike that united the line from San Francisco to Los Angeles. Long time CHSSC member Emma Louie wrote *The Golden Spike: The Chinese Contribution* in the Centennial Souvenir Program, September 5, 1976. Former California Secretary of State March Fong Eu participated in both celebrations.

CHSSC Open House Picnic



Dedication Ceremony for Stockton Chinese Cemetery Restoration

A beautiful new entrance gate, designed by architect Clifford Jew, now welcomes visitors to Stockton's historic Chinese cemetery. A ceremony to dedicate the gate and many other recent improvements will be held on Sunday, October 14, 2007 at 11:30 in the morning. The dedication will culminate years of fundraising activity and largely volunteer efforts to beautify the cemetery. Members of the San Joaquin County Board of Supervisors and the Stockton City Council are expected to be present.

In addition to the gateway, the cemetery's roadways have been widened, a new sprinkler system installed, and other landscaping improvements carried out. Flowering cherry trees and Italian cypresses now line its borders.

Established in 1925, Stockton's Chinese cemetery is one of the few exclusively Chinese cemeteries still operating in the western United States. It was once the only place where Stockton's Chinese families could bury their deceased. It is the resting place of many generations of Stockton's oldest Chinese families. Some Chinese pioneers once relegated to a segregated section of the first city cemetery were re-interred in the Chinese cemetery in the 1930s.

The Chinese Cemetery is located at the intersection of Interstate 5 and Mathews Road in the community of French Camp, immediately south of Stockton's city limits. For information on the cemetery or the dedication, please contact Conrad Mar at 209-466-2428.


