Portrait of Pride - II - Chinese American Legacies - First 160 Years will be published early 2009. We need your financial support to carry out our Free-to-Library book program. Your gift is 100% tax deductible.

One donor gave CHSSC a qualified charitable distribution (QCD) from her IRA fund taking advantage of two new laws, the Emergency Economic Stabilization Act of 2008 and the Pension Protection Act of 2006 as amended. Ordinarily, distributions from a traditional IRA will be taxable to the recipient, who may not be able to offset the income fully because of the percentage limitations on charitable contribution deductions. A QCD made directly by the trustee of the taxpayer's IRA to a charitable organization would not be included in taxable income if the following conditions are met:

- 1. The taxpayer must have been at least $70\frac{1}{2}$ years old when the distribution was made.
- 2. Total QCDs for the year cannot be more than \$100,000.
- 3. If the IRA includes nondeductible contributions, the distribution is first considered to be paid out of otherwise taxable income.
- 4. The taxpayer cannot claim a charitable contribution deduction for any QCD not included in income.
- 5. A QCD counts as a distribution for required minimum distribution rules purposes.

The above is as explained to CHSSC staff by our financial advisor. Please consult your accountant regarding your situation. We welcome any type of donation, QCD or not. You may specify whether the gift is for CHSSC's general fund or any specific area such as the PoP project, education, outreach, etc. We accept QCD, stock transfer, VISA or MC, check or cash. PORTRAITS OF PRIDE BOOK SERIES: AN IMPORTANT PROJECT FOR THE PRESENT AND FUTURE GENERATIONS

After spending almost three years in researching, writing and editing the second book in a series, "Portraits of Pride-Book 2: Chinese-American Legacies—First 160 Years in America", L.P. Leung,
Director of Portraits of Pride Book 2 (PoP 2), along with our PoP Team can breathe a sigh of relief as the book was turned over to our production layout editor.

During the past five years, Dr. Wing Mar and L.P. Leung, with the help of staff, worked tirelessly and persistently to raise over \$300,000 to fund our PoP Project. To date, over 7,000 complimentary copies of PoP-Book 1 have been distributed to selected school and public libraries across the United States.

What is the catalyst behind L.P. Leung's commitment to take on such an ambitious project? According to L.P., he and Dr. Wing Mar, Founder and Director of PoP 1, were compelled by Wen-Ho Lee's case to tell the stories of the positive contributions Chinese Americans have made to our country. The Chinese Americans not only "rose above great legislated obstacles to overcome racial prejudices, they succeeded in their professions."

One reason the books are distributed to school libraries is due to the fact Chinese American history is not being taught in schools. Another reason, in LP's words, is "We want our youth to feel the *pride* about our contributions as we do. And to understand that, given the opportunity, they can accomplish great things just like any American."

PoP 1 focused on 39 Chinese American individuals from the Great Depression and World War II era. PoP 2 expands the book scope to include *Unsung Heroes* such as M.C. Chang, co-inventor of the oral birth control pill; James Wong Howe, a two-time Oscar winning cinematographer; and Mrs. Lily Chin, an unlikely heroine who fought racial injustice on behalf of her son, Vincent Chin. The book will also feature a special *group portrait section*, highlighting the hard work of our

forgotten heroes such as Chinese Americans who built our railroads, reclaimed many acres of fertile farmlands, and were pioneers in the fishing industry. To top it off, *Superstars* such as Michelle Kwan, I.M. Pei and several of our Nobel Prize winners, including recently esignated Secretary of Energy, Steven Chu, will be spotlighted.

L.P. Leung thanks all of the participants in the PoP-Book 2 Project. "Putting 160 years of Chinese-American achievement in a 300-page book is indeed a very challenging task. I believe the final product will more than justify our effort."

In order to continue this very important historical project to educate the present and future generations of the struggles and accomplishments of the Chinese Americans who paved the way for us, we need necessary funds. Steven Chu Nominated Secretary of Energy

Dr. Steven Chu, 1997 Nobel Laureate in physics has been nominated for Secretary of Energy by President-elect Obama. Dr. Chu was born in the United States to highly educated immigrants from China. Currently he is the Director of Lawrence Berkeley Laboratory. He is profiled in PoP Book 2.



Online Oral History of Chinese-Canadians of the 19th Century

The Chinese-Canadians and Chinese-Americans share not only a common ancestry but common

experiences in their adopted countries. The first Chinese migrants to British Columbia was by way of San Francisco lured by discovery of gold on the Fraser River.

The Vancouver Public Library, in partnership with Library and Archives Canada developed a wiki-based project that creates a portrait of the early Chinese-Canadian community. (A wiki is a page or collection of webpages designed to enable anyone who accesses it to contribute or modify content.) The project, "Chinese-Canadians: Profiles from a Community," was officially launched May 28, 2008. The goal is to collect and share individual stories of those who were born in Canada to parents of Chinese origin before 1901.


Under Section 18 of Canada's 1923 *Chinese Immigration Act*, all Chinese including those born in Canada were required to register. As a result of this registration, a listing of Canadian-born Chinese was produced and forms the core of this Chinese Canadian history wiki. The lives of these early immigrants are very sketchy at this time. The

profiles are designed to capture more details with the goal of completing their stories over time.

The wiki can be used as resources in searching for stories of these early Chinese-Canadians. Because of the historic trans-border migration of Chinese immigrants between the U.S. and Canada and the common origins of the Chinese population in both countries, the Vancouver Public Library staff notified CHSSC of this project.


