The Los Angeles Chinese Drum and Bugle Corps (LAC)--later known as the "Imperial Dragons"--was a very successful award-winning youth performance organization that remained active in the Los Angeles Chinese American community for over 20 years. The LAC continued a tradition of community performance organizations that began with the Mei Wah Drum Corps in the early 1930s and the Chung Wah Drum and Bugle Corps in the 1950s.

Comprised of Asian American youth between 10 and 21 years of age, the LAC in the early 1970s became one of the largest Corps organizations in existence, fielding 140 members for competition. It was also one of the only nationally touring drum corps representing an ethnic community. In addition to regular appearances at annual Chinese New Year celebrations and other Chinatown events, the LAC proudly represented their community with performances and in competition throughout California and also grew to achieve national distinction and recognition.

Former members, parents and other supporters (many of whom are CHSSC members past and present) have had a long standing ambition to create and preserve an official institutional historic record that would be produced, disseminated, and made accessible to educate the public on the significant contributions of the LAC whose celebrated past played an integral part of so many lives in the Asian American community.



PoP II not only highlights world-class achievers such as Yo-Yo Ma, Michelle Kwan and the Chinese American Nobel laureates, but also chronicles unsung heroes such as Lily Chin. The book's account that touched me most was that of Mrs. Chin whose son Vincent was brutally murdered in a highly charged racial context. Most readers remember his name, and the story of Lily Chin is thoroughly told in PoP II in "A Mother's Relentless Courage to Fight Racial Injustice." Without sharing the book's full accounting, a thumbnail sketch of the case will refresh our memories.

In 1982, in Detroit, the U.S. auto industry was being battered by the public's insatiable appetite for Japanese imports. Job loss was rampant among auto

workers and many focused their anger on Asian Americans. In a neighborhood tavern, Ronald Ebens, who later that evening beat Vincent Chin to death, said to him, "It's because of you [expletive] that we're out of work." Ebens and his co-conspirator, Michael Nitz, never spent a day behind bars for their heinous act, infuriating Asian-American communities across the nation.

Lily Chin, Vincent's mother, was thrust into a limelight she never sought. She was a hard-working woman who supported her family in the restaurant and laundry businesses. But despite not being highly educated or speaking English fluently, she became a galvanizing presence to rally the fight for a U.S. Department of Justice civil rights prosecution.

If there was a silver lining, the events generated a pan Asian-American movement for social justice, leading to formation of activist groups such as the Asian American Justice Center.




