In celebrating over one hundred years of tradition, the Chinese Chamber of Commerce of Los Angeles presents the 113th Annual Golden Dragon Parade. With over thousands and thousands of individuals lining the parade route and thousands viewing the telecast each year, this colorful celebration along North Broadway in Chinatown has become the premiere cultural event in the Southern California Asian-American Community.

Since the mid-1980's, the Golden Dragon Parade has expanded to include almost two dozen floats, multiple marching bands, government officials, various dignitaries, entertainers, local business leaders and cultural groups. The parade's theme emphasizes ethnic diversity, Chinese Culture and exposure to Chinese-American businesses. The parade continues to be a rich and diverse experience for Angelenos of all ages and ethnicities.

The day of the Lunar New Year is the most celebrated holiday of the year for nearly 1.5 million persons of Chinese, Korean, and Vietnamese descent in Southern California. It is celebrated with colorful festivals, parades, and most importantly, large family gatherings. It is also a time when ancestors are fondly remembered and families give thanks for their blessings. Red packets of money ("Lai See" or "Hung Bao") and fire-crackers add fun and excitement to the Chinese New Year celebration.

Dear friends,

As the year closes, my job as CHSSC Membership Secretary begins in earnest. We appreciate your membership this past year. I am writing to encourage you to renew your membership for the coming year, 2012. As in past years, CHSSC has 4 different levels of membership: Senior/ student (\$32/year; Silver (\$57); 100 X 100 (\$100/year); and Diamond (\$300). The membership fee includes the receipt of our monthly newsletter, News 'N Notes, and our yearly Gum Saan Journal.

However, CHSSC provides much more. CHSSC has monthly meetings throughout the school year that are free to the public. As an educational organization, volunteers, as well as staff, conduct walking tours and attend local conferences. Our outreach also includes scheduling talks at surrounding venues and supporting local organizations. CHSSC continues to collect oral histories and other information about the history of the Chinese in America. At our yearly fund-raising dinner we give recognition to those who have made significant contributions to the community.

CHSSC has published three books during the past two years. First, CHSSC partnered with Jenny Cho to publish her two books: Chinatown in Los Angeles and Chinatown and China City in Los Angeles. Published earlier this year, our Portraits of Pride II, will help us get nationwide recognition. POP II, which profiles important Chinese Americans, is the culmination of 7 years of work by a core of dedicated CHSSC volunteers.

The membership fee barely covers the cost to print and send the newsletter and Gum Saan Journal. However, the fee does not cover the cost of the personnel needed to write and mail the newsletter as well as keep the office open to the public 40 hours a week. Likewise, membership doesn't cover the cost of building maintenance and upgrades or property taxes. In the past we have only been able to fund CHSSC through special donations from those committed to our mission. Therefore, I am hoping that in addition to your support through membership, that you will also consider increasing your level of membership or giving an additional amount this year.

Portraits of Pride II Fundraiser Tops off 2011

To the delight of the Portraits of Pride (PoP) team, Pete Chinn, former CHSSC board member and current president of the Chinese Consolidated Benevolent Association (CCBA), coordinated a fundraising dinner for PoP II. CCBA is made up of 27 different Chinese community associations and have been around for 120 years. To publicize the fundraiser, a news conference and luncheon, which was open to the public, took place Dec. 2nd at the Golden Dragon Restaurant. LP Leung, director of PoP II, was interviewed by two news agencies. Both he and Eugene Moy, president of CHSSC, were asked to say a few words about the PoP project to the officers of the associations. Gordon Hom set up equipment to show the PoP II PowerPoint, and Marian Chew was present to help with sales of the books.

After a big screen, PowerPoint presentation on PoP II, Pete Chinn addressed the purpose of the Portraits of Pride book series and the importance of passing this knowledge on to the next generation. Eugene Moy then talked in detail about the books' contents and Joyce Mar spoke on LP Leung's behalf about the goals of the book project. Yvonne Chang, who oversaw the silent auction, guarded the items closely and answered questions from potential bidders. Albert Chang, Mei Ong and Marian Chew stood ready to accommodate purchasers of the PoP II book. The Golden Dragon Restaurant was gaily decorated with huge and colorful Christmas balloons onstage, tinsel trees at each table, and filled with laughter, talk, and the clanging of dishes, making it a warm and festive locale on an otherwise chilly evening.
