Is Part of Your Family History in the Y.C. Hong Case Files?

I recently contacted Li Wei Yang at the Huntington Library to see if my grandfather may have been a client of You Chung Hong. I was surprised and pleased to find out that my grandfather did see Y.C. Hong for legal advice in 1930. I went to the Huntington, and Li Wei showed me the case file. My grandfather needed to make sure that his documents were in order, so that he would be able to return to the U.S. after a brief visit in Guangdong to see his family.

You Chung Hong practiced law in Los Angeles Chinatown from the 1920s and into the 1960s. His legal papers are archived at the Huntington Library and include over 7,000 case files and more than 600 coaching papers. Most of his clients were Cantonese and needed immigration assistance, especially for their wives and children.

If you were a Chinese family living in Los Angeles pre-1965, you may have seen Y.C. Hong for immigration or legal advice. If so, you will discover more about your family history in the file(s). (There may be confidentiality restrictions on seeing recent files.) I encourage you to contact Li Wei Yang, Archivist at the Huntington, to see if your ancestor has a case file.
