Finding KUKAN:

A Chinese American Filmmaker's Perspective

At the end of 2009 Hawaii-based documentary filmmaker Robin Lung discovered a 1941 Oscar-winning color film on China that had fallen into almost total obscurity after being lost for decades. Her documentary in progress, Finding KUKAN, chronicles her quest to restore the lost film KUKAN to its rightful place in history and uncover the story of KUKAN's makers – the unconventional Hawaii Chinese author and playwright Li Ling-Ai, and the adventurous photojournalist Rey Scott. Lung will present video clips from Finding KUKAN and the un-restored 1941 film KUKAN as she speaks about her filmmaker's journey thus far.

About Robin Lung: Robin Lung is a fourth generation Chinese American who was raised in Hawaii. A graduate of Stanford University and Hunter College in NYC, Lung completed a successful career in publishing and university administration before becoming a self-taught documentary filmmaker ten years ago. As a filmmaker she is driven by a desire to preserve the stories of extraordinary people from minority backgrounds who are often overlooked by mainstream media. Lung made her directorial debut with Washington Place: Hawaii's First Home, a 30-minute documentary for PBS Hawaii about Hawaii's historic governor's mansion and home of Queen Liliuokalani (aired December 2008). She was the Associate Producer for the national PBS documentary Patsy Mink: Ahead of the Majority (aired October 2008). She was the Hawaii Unit Producer for the acclaimed documentary Vivan Las Antipodas! by Russian filmmaker Victor Kossakovsky, and has produced numerous short documentaries for the Historic Hawaii Foundation.

Mission Statement

The Chinese Historical Society of Southern California was organized in November 1975. The purposes of the Society are: 1) to bring together people with a mutual interest in the important history and historical role of Chinese and Chinese Americans in southern California; 2) to pursue, preserve and communicate knowledge of this history; and 3) to promote the heritage of the Chinese and Chinese American community in support of a better appreciation of the rich, multicultural society of the United States.

2013 Ch'ing Ming Festival

On April 6, 2013 CHSSC hosted Ch'ing Ming (Chinese Memorial Day) Festival at the historic Chinese Memorial Shrine at Evergreen Cemetery. The ceremony included a special remembrance of Randall Bloch, champion of the preservation of the Chinese Memorial Shrine. The Shrine stands at the center of what was once a 19th century Chinese cemetery. Built in 1888 by the people of Los Angeles' Old Chinatown, the Shrine is considered the earliest extant Chinese structure in Los Angeles. The site remains culturally and historically significant and has been designated Los Angeles Historic/Cultural Monument No. 486. It is owned and maintained by CHSSC.


Grand Star Jazz Club

Owned and operated by the Quon family for over 67 years. Him Gin Quon and his wife Yiu Hai Quon opened Grand Star Restaurant after World War II. The Quon family has been a part of Los Angeles for over a hundred years and are pioneering entrepreneurs in the Chinatown restaurant industry. Grand Star eventually transitioned from a restaurant into a nightclub, playing an important role in Chinatown's social life. Grand Star Jazz Club serves as a popular meeting place for celebrities, politicians, athletes, and other important members of the community. Today, it is run by brothers Wallace and Frank Quon, along with Frank's son Tony.

Jin Hing & Co.

One of the oldest continuously operating Chinese jewelryantique stores in Southern California. Lee King Yee, a Master Goldsmith, and his son Leon Lee founded Jin Hing Co. during the Great Depression in 1933. The store was originally located at 446 ½ Los Angeles Street selling jewelry only. The business would move to its current location at 412 Bamboo Lane in 1950 where it began to sell both jewelry and antiques. Robert "Bob" Lee, son of Leon Lee, would take over the business and amass an impressive collection of Chinese antiques. Bob continues to run the store today specializing in a variety of items such as jewelry, antiques, rare books, and snuff bottles.





K.G. Louie

Established by Ping Yuen Louie on the corner of Gin Ling Way and Sun Mun Way in Central Plaza in 1938. Rich cultural figurines, jades, vases, trinkets, and postcards first sold during its grand opening are still sold to this day. Ping Yuen Louie would marry Lee Shee Louie. Ping Yuen Louie's children continue to preserve and keep their father's legacy alive by working at the Louie store. K.G. Louie serves as a symbol of success and perseverance during times when founding Chinese families were prohibited from buying property, obtaining bank loans, and securing desirable jobs.

Phoenix Bakery

Founded in 1938 by Fung Chow Chan and his wife, Wai Hing, the idea was to produce traditional Chinese pastries and cookies not found locally. Chow's brother Lun Chan would join the business and help introduce the traditional fresh strawberry whipped cream cake. With a growing repertoire of desserts and pastries, Phoenix Bakery became a staple in Chinatown, moving to it's now current location on Broadway in 1977 to accommodate its high demand. The next generation of Chans, including Kelly, a CPA, and Youlen, a graduate of the American Institute of Baking have taken over the responsibilities and continue to make quality pastries and desserts for the people of Los Angeles.

Phoenix Imports

Both Phoenix Imports and Hop Louie Restaurant are owned and operated by Walter SooHoo. The SooHoo family dates back to Old Chinatown when She Wing SooHoo, Walter SooHoo's father, opened Chew Yuen Company at 308 Marchessault Street. She Wing would become one of the founding business owners of New Chinatown. In 1981, Walter SooHoo purchased Phoenix Imports' storefront previously occupied by the Mu Brothers. Walter SooHoo named Phoenix Imports after his wife Eileen SooHoo's Chinese name. Both businesses are maintained by Walter and Eileen to this day.





Sincere Imports

Started in 1938 by Fong Kin Chin and Ida Leong Chin as, Sincere Gift Shop, a little booth in Old Chinatown on Olvera Street. Fong and Ida would have three children; Sylvia, Johnny, and Joyce who would grow up with the shop. Johnny Chin and his mother Ida continued the family legacy after moving the store to its current location on Gin Ling Way in Central Plaza. Sincere Gift Shop would be renamed Sincere Imports. One of the store goals is to specialize in the importing of Chinese art, artifacts, and heritage through its items for sale in Chinatown.

Celebrating 130 Years Castelar Street Elementary School

This will also include an open house after the celebration in the multipurpose room hosted by the school. The new Music Room will have historic photos that will be available for public viewing.

In 1882, Los Angeles opened a four-room school across from the French Hospital. In 1903, the main building of the little school was destroyed by fire and a 13-room Victorian structure was built in its place. By the 1970s, the Victorian gave way to a new 33-room complex.

Castelar Elementary School is the second oldest continuously operating school in the Los Angeles Unified School District. Through these 130 years, Castelar School has successfully laid the academic foundation for many generations of children. Castelar remains a unique part of Los Angeles' multicultural history.
